

FOUR TOP CAMPERS RECEIVE AWARDS

Four campers were singled out for special honors at the final formation of the 1948 Camp in recognition of their outstanding work during their stay at Farragut.

Camper H. Stutzke scored the highest number of points in the Senior Division with a total of 350. J. Stevenson scored 328 points to place first in the Junior Division.



We are deeply indebted to Mr. Hayes who is our counselor, and who has made us what we are today. Wherever you go there is a Junior Company One camper leading the way.



LCI (G) PROVIDES THRILL FOR CAMPERS ON OUTING

The L.C.I. left the Academy at 0945 for Barnegat Bay. It slowly drifted from the dock, turned around and started pushing its way up the river. Passing Island Heights provided a beautiful sight to behold from the ship! Just then those on board heard a whistle that meant inspection. Lt. Commander Bobo stepped up and formed two parties, and a careful inspection was made. After this, Lt. Commander Bobo took them up to the conning tower to see how the ship was run. He demonstrated the compass and told them a few interesting things about it. From up here they could see a line forming for Mess, so everybody went down and got something to eat.

After Mess they went down and saw the engine room with eight huge Diesel engines. Then, all the boys who had fishing rods went fishing. After fishing for about an hour, the anchor was hoisted and we started for home. On the way back a lot of the boys got to steer the ship for a while. 

Waterfront News

To the average camper at Farragut the Waterfront is very important. About onequarter of a camper's activities are participated in at the waterfront. Such things as rowing, sailing, swimming, and the general seamanship that a cadet learns, are allwaterfront activities. There are fishing trips in the 36-foot L.C.V.P., and cruises on the 157-foot L.C.I. (G) 538, which is the School's flagship. The fleet also includes six whaleboats, three sailing cutters, a sculling sampan, three sloop-rigged knockabouts, six large Marconi-Rigged 18foot Catboaks, six small gaff-rigged sneak boxes, and various other craft. These boats are kept in shape by "Matt" Shaw, the boatman, who is doing an excellent job. Under Commander N. F. Reinhard, Chief Stevenson is in direct charge of the waterfront, ably assisted by Chiefs Baker and Fairchild. Mr. Cooke is in charge of the swimming classes, and is assisted by Sam Brown.

One of the main activities of the waterfront is sailing, and the Intercompany sailing races have always caused much excite-ment, with "Windy" Curran of the Second, winning five out of the first six races and hoping for a victory in the final competitions. Tom Schlobohm, whose crew, Tony Bodin, is an expert who races his own boat at home, and Sam Heineman III, follow close behind. Sam has had some bad luck in the last two races, forgetting a buoy in one, thus dropping from second to fifth, and fouling another boat in the second race; but Sam showed great sportsmanship by dropping from the race. Tom Schlobohm has also had some bad luck. While in one race without Tony as crew, he lost a headstay and rammed another boat sailed by "Windy" Curran. All in all, a keen sense of competition and fairness has been displayed.
