## Outstanding Spring Concert Presented

The full Band opened the show with the National Anthem and from that went into "Victory at Sea." Cadet Horne was featured next in "Soliloquy for Trumpet." The Band finished up its portion of the show with Ravel's famous "Bolero." From 4:15 to 5:30 parents will be received by the Academic Board and the faculty in the lounge of Farragut Hall. At this reception parents will have still another opportunity to discuss their sons with the academic and military departments of the School.

For many years Parents' Day has been held at Farragut each Spring and it has become an institution and tradition which is looked forward to with the greatest pleasure by all.

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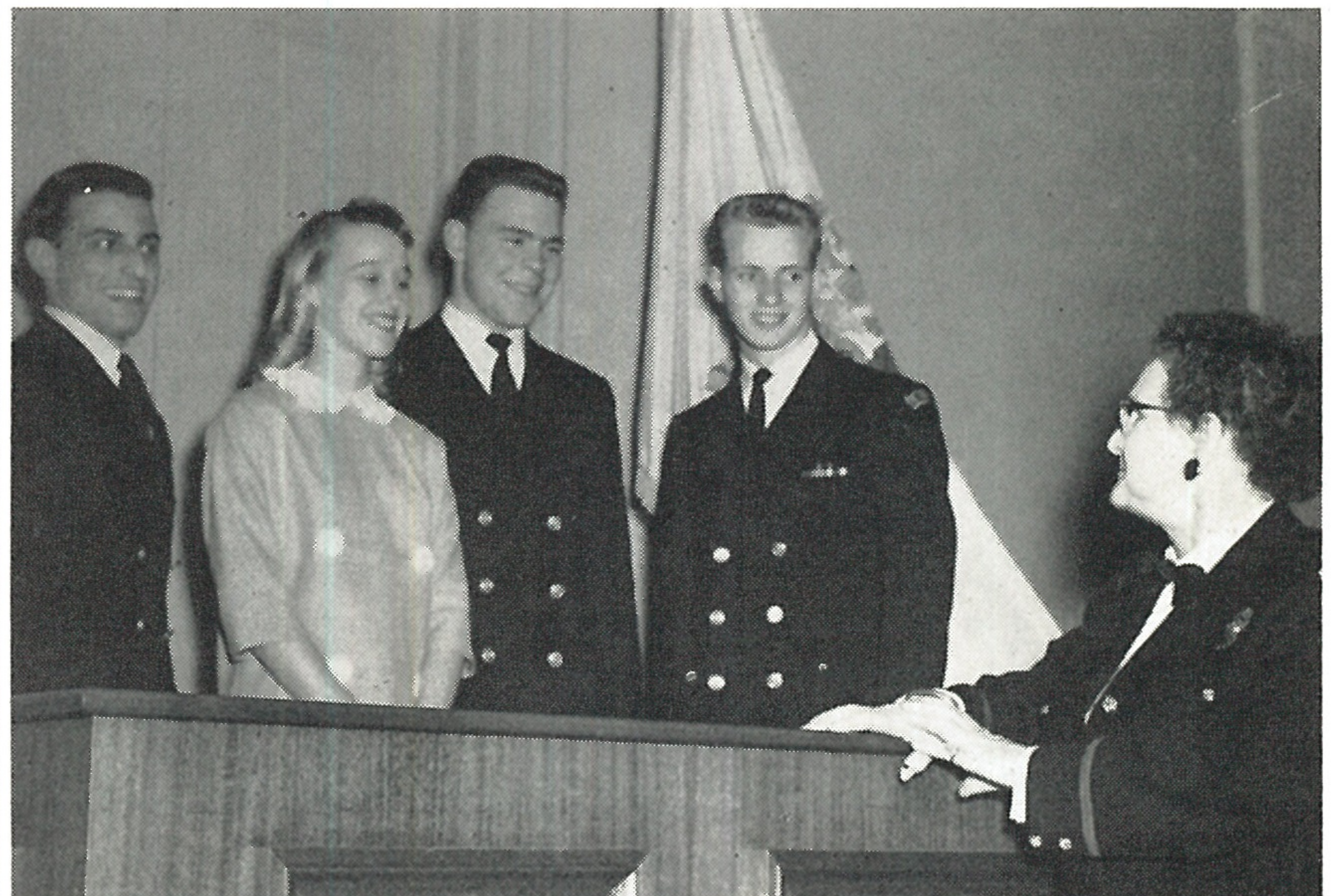

## Varsity Nine Defeats Hun; Drops All Others

The Farragut Varsity baseball team opened its season with a victory over Hun School, but lost four successive games to Perkiomen, George School, B.M.I., and Valley Forge Military Academy. The Varsity nine's game against West Nottingham on May 3, was cancelled because of rain.

### Hun

The Middie baseball squad opened its '58 campaign with a victory over the Hun School on April 16. Playing on Hun's diamond, the Farragut nine easily scored two runs in the first innings and two more in the second frame. However, Hun came back with two successive hits in their half of the second inning to dust across a run. But the Slabymen scored two runs in the third, to lead 6-1 at the end of three innings. The Middies scored once more in the fifth and Hun scored once in the sixth and seventh innings, and the score stood 3-3. The winning pitcher for Farragut was Joe Lucarelli.

Joe, who won All-State Honors last year as a third baseman, has turned his talents to pitching. However, he will play third, when he is not pitching. In the hitting department Mal Loyer led the team with 2 hits and 4 trips to the plate for the game.

### Perkiomen

On April 19, the Varsity 9 traveled to Pennsburg, Pa. to receive their first set-back of the season at the hands of the Perkiomen Prep men. Poor hitting and costly errors proved to be the deciding factor in the 4-0 loss. Dave Robinson, the Middie hurler, scattered 7 hits through 7 innings; however, errors in the field allowed Perkiomen to score twice in the first inning and twice in the fourth. Farragut's offensive put men on base just about every inning, but could not bring them around to score. Woody Hassinger was the top player for the Slabymen in the hitting department with 2 hits and a walk for 3 times at bat.

### George School

The Farragut nine received its second setback at the hands of George School on April 24. Playing their first home game of the season, the "Middie" nine was leading George School by a score of 6-2 going into the top half of the seventh inning. Hits by Larry Ewert, Dave Robinson, Mike Pero, and Mike Sullivan had driven in the six tallies for the Slabymen. However, "Middie" hurler Dave Robinson began to tire in the last inning and he loaded the bases. Then on two hits by George School and two costly errors by Farragut, George School scored six runs in the seventh and final inning to win the game 8-6.

### Bordentown

On April 26, the "Middies" received their third defeat at the hands of Bordentown Military Institute, 8-3. The Slabymen took an early lead in the first inning when Mal Loyer hit a bases-loaded double, driving in two runs. The B.M.I. cadets didn't get their hitting attack rolling until the fourth inning when they scored four times to take a 4-2 lead. However, the Farragut nine came back with one run, when Woody Hassinger singled and was brought home by a hit by Mike Sullivan. However, B.M.I. scored twice more in the fifth and seventh frames. The "Middies" just couldn't cut down B.M.I. The losing pitcher was Wardy Briggs, for Farragut and the winning hurler was Mc Henry for B.M.I.

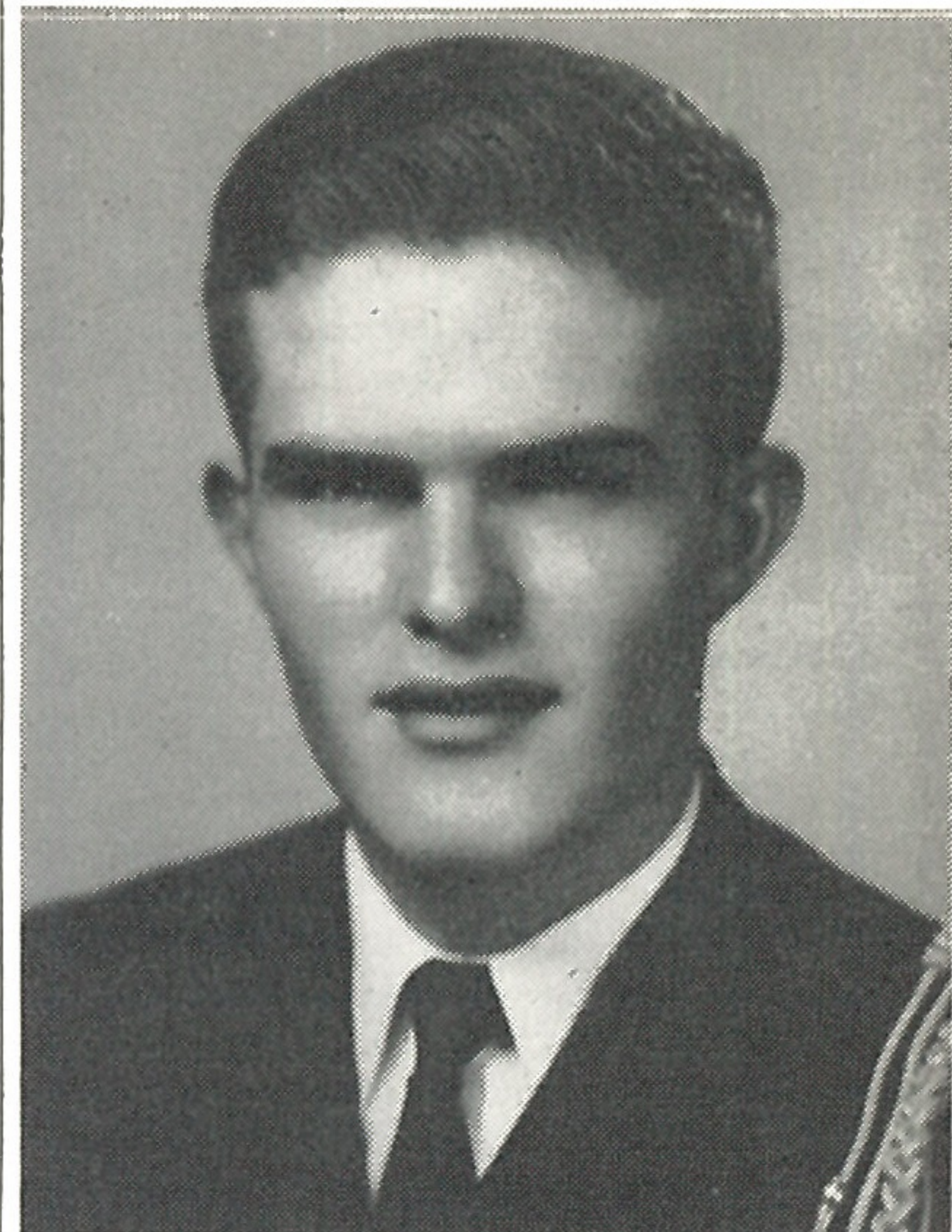


**Richard Payne**
