Commencement Speaker Lauds School's Record In Address to Grads

Dr. Clarence R. Moll, president of the Penn Morton Colleges, climaxed the 34th annual June Week program, when he addressed the Class of 1967 and over 1,000 guests at commencement exercises on Sunday, June 4, here in Robison Hall.

The youthful head of what is also known as Pennsylvania Military College, Chester, Pa., praised the Academy by telling his listeners that Farragut stands apart from other educational institutions in achievement, policy, and record. "Few schools offer such an integrated program," he said, "and you, the members of this year's graduating class, should be proud to be able to attend Admiral Farragut Academy."

President Moll told his audience that the solutions to Man's problems are not solved with loud noises and outward demonstrations. "We look to others for peace, but those who find it, find it within themselves. Your generation holds within its grasp the solution of problems that are with us. While leadership is vital, each of you must dedicate yourselves to keeping abreast with the arts, music, literature, drama, in addition to all other studies of technical and scientific nature so that you will have a better understanding of human nature."

"You must advance to improve yourselves professionally, and you must give of your time and leadership to colleges, education, politics, and to spiritual and moral relationships," he said. "You have your life in your hands. You have a right to shape it yourself, but remember, shape it well!" Dr. Moll concluded.

The rest of the commencement program consisted of invocation and benediction by The Reverend A. G. Van Dyke, Academy Chaplain, salutatory by Cadet Robert R. Jauernig, presentation of awards by the Headmaster, induction of Cum Laude members, presentation of diplomas, valedictory by Cadet Gregory C. MacIsaac, and the singing of the Alma Mater. The National Anthem was played by the Band, and the Class of '67 members concluded by tossing their caps into the rafters of Robison Hall.

New Position, Three Appointments Announced By Board of Trustees

A major administrative and personnel change establishing a new position and the appointment of three officers to fill three different posts on the Administrative Staff, has been announced by the Academy's Board of Trustees. The change became effective on August 19.

Effective on this date, Captain Norman F. Reinhard, AFA, became the Dean of Students, Captain Fred N. Klein, USN, Ret., was transferred from the post of Director of Naval Science to become Director of Activities and Naval Training, and Commander Richard E. Duncan, USN, Ret., has been appointed to replace Captain Klein as Head of the Dept. of Naval Instruction for the Academy's Honor Naval School program, and Instructor in charge of the Navy's Junior ROTC program.

The position of Dean of Students has been established to provide a better unified and more comprehensive guidance approach to all phases of the cadet's progress at Farragut. The new Dean will be responsible for all psychological, achievement, and National Testing programs. He will be responsible for the coordination and the development of the Academy's present guidance efforts in the educational and social phases of the life of the cadets. He will develop a more comprehensive program of professional individual counseling, and he will direct and coordinate the guidance activities of the faculty.

The Dean of Students will function from a new office-classroom facility that has been added to the present Academic Headquarters building. The classroom will be used by the Junior School.

Captain Reinhard

Captain Reinhard has been on the School's staff since 1940, when he first joined the faculty as a member of the History Dept. He has served as Director of Activities and Director of the Summer Camp program for the past 24 years. He earned his Doctor's degree in Psychology from Temple U. and is currently a member of the American Psychological Association and a Certified Examiner for the New Jersey State Dept. of Education.

Captain Klein

Captain Klein first joined the Academy staff on Feb. 1, 1965, and he served as Assistant Director of Naval Science under Captain Paul C. Crosley until his retirement on August 31, 1966. He completed his first full year of duty as head of the Dept. of Naval Instruction in charge of the Honor School program, and, as Naval Science Instructor has been in charge of the NJROTC program during this time.

Captain Klein retired from the Navy in 1962 after serving his last three years at NAS Lakehurst, N. J., the first two years as Commodore Fleet Airship Wing One, and the last year as Commanding Officer of the Station. His naval career began in 1931. He was commissioned in 1935 and progressed through the ranks, being promoted to captain in 1956. Capt. Klein became a naval officer in 1942. During World War II he served on the USS New Mexico in the North Atlantic, commanded the Naval Air Facility at Santa Cruz, Brazil, commanded Airship Squadron 33, and was commanding officer of the Tillamook, Ore., Naval Air Station.

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Farragut's First Admiral Is Named

Shannon D. Cramer, Class of 1940, has been nominated to become Farragut's first Navy Admiral!

One of 38 captains to be selected for Rear Admiral by President Johnson on June 8, Cramer was selected for duty at the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Wash., D. C., effective August 4th.

A native of Wash., D. C., he entered the U. S. Naval Academy in 1940 and graduated in 1943 (Class of 1944) due to the accelerated war program. He served in destroyers USS LAUB (DD-613) and USS FURSE (DD-882) in both the Atlantic and Pacific theaters until 1946, entering the U. S. Naval Submarine School at New London, Conn., in 1947. He has served in submarines USS COCHINO (SS-345), USS CORPORAL (SS-346), USS HALF-BEAK (SS-352) and USS COBBLER (SS-344). He has had command of USS SIRAGO (SS-485), USS SWORDFISH (SSN-579) and completed three patrols as the Gold Crew CO of the USS PATRICK HENRY (SSBN-599).

From 1951-1953 he was an instructor at the U. S. Naval Submarine School; 1956-57 he served in the Naval Reactors Branch, Atomic Energy Commission in Wash., D. C.; 1960-61 he was in the Office of Chief of Naval Operations (Op-31) as Head, Nuclear Propulsion Section, and from 1961-63 he was Commander of Submarine Division 102 in New London, Conn. In October, 1964, he reported to the Staff, Commander Submarine Force, U. S. Pacific Fleet as the Assistant Chief of Staff for Polaris. On July 15, 1966, he assumed command of Submarine Squadron Fifteen in Guam.

He married the former Elizabeth Stewart of Phila., Pa., and they have five children, Shannon III, John, Elizabeth, Susan and Mary.

The 1940 Trident carried the following biographical information about Shannon Cramer when he was a Cadet:

"Shannon is the kind of boy whom it is a pleasure to live with. He is tall, blond, good-looking, and has a wonderful personality. Any time you want help or feel like 'shooting the breeze,' his time is yours. 'Roscoe's' word can always be taken as definite. He seldom says anything he doesn't mean, and he is fair and square in everything he does.

"Roscoe" is a stalwart tackle, and his opponents say that he is a hard man to move. He was one of the mainstays on the First Company basketball team. He is a good and consistent student. We are all sure that he will reach his goal, the Naval Academy."

As a Cadet he participated in varsity football, Inter-Co. basketball, baseball, and track, and was a Petty Officer 2/C in the First Co.

Renovation Plans For Robison Hall

A major renovation of Robison Hall is presently underway, and, when completed, should turn the building into one of the best facilities on campus. Accepting a \$6,000 gift from the Farragut Parents' Association to install an accoustical ceiling and accoustical panelling on the walls in an effort to improve the large room's sound qualities, the Academy decided to add approximately \$8,000 more to completely re-wire the building, install new lighting, provide required ventilation, and paint the entire interior of the first floor level.

Winfield T. Irwin '44, father of Cadet W. P. Irwin '70, has been instrumental in getting the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Co., to donate the material to be used on the walls. A new product, it will be the first time it is used on a commercial project such as this, and it is expected to improve the accoustics in the hall considerably. Mr. Irwin is Installation Products Development Supervisor for PPG.

Robison Hall is used for basketball, large assemblies, dances and musical and dramatics productions.

Parents of Robert Weldon '56 Set Up Scholarship Grant In His Memory

A scholarship grant that will provide an annual assistance of \$1000 to a Cadet attending Farragut in the future, has been established in memory of Robert Fulton Weldon, Jr., Class of 1956, by his parents, according to an announcement by Captain R. O. Dodge, Headmaster.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Weldon, Sr., Westfield, N. J., in setting up the grant, have indicated that the grant will be awarded annually, at the discretion of the donor, to that applicant or applicants who have financial need, who have demonstrated proficiency in extra-curricular pursuits, and who have satisfactorily met the entrance requirements of the Academy. Further, the recipients must have a love of competitive athletic sports, a wholesome appreciation of the outdoors and the sea, and be all-round outstanding young men with a zest for life.

The grant will be made to the candidate or candidates who have met the above qualifications and who will best contribute to the Academy's athletic program. Candidates for the award will be approved and recommended by the Academy Scholarship Committee after consultation with the Director of Athletics.

Longtime friends of the Academy, the Weldons had two sons who graduated from Farragut: One, after whom the grant is named, was Robert in 1956; the other, Richard, in 1962.

Robert died suddenly on August 23, 1961, and Mr. and Mrs. Weldon gave a gift of \$7500 to pay for the cost of constructing the Weldon Room (for First Classmen) in Shepard Hall. After graduating from Farragut, Bob attended Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, receiving his degree in Business Administration there in 1960. While at Miami he was a member of the Economics Society and was on the Dean's list during his senior year. He had been associated as a trainee with the Weldon Asphalt Corp., and was also a member of the Mantoloking Yacht Club and Ducks Unlimited.

Bob spent three years at Farragut, and while a Cadet was active with the Capstan Staff, Booster Club, Monogram Club, Chapel Club, Trident Staff, Activities Council, Hop Committee, and Co-tillion Club. He also captained the varsity basketball team, and participated in varsity track and baseball. He was a member of the Second Company and held the rank of LTJG.

School's First Publicity Director Dies In Calif.

Harold E. Reice, one of the charter members of the Academy staff when the school was first founded in 1933 and the first Publicity Director, died in February of this year.

Mr. Reice, a native of Media, Pa., left Farragut in 1942 to accept a commission in the Navy, and he continued to serve on active duty until he retired as a LCDR in 1950. He settled in Calif., and was associated with the Taylor Publishing firm, Texas, specializing in the publication of yearbooks for naval vessels.

In addition to his publicity duties at Farragut, he also was skipper of the Academy's cruiser, Joseph, and other fishing craft, taking summer campers on daily fishing trips.

Headmaster Cites Academy's Mission

When Captain R. O. Dodge, Headmaster, addressed the parents during the annual meeting of the Farragut Parents' Association on May 7th, he received a very favorable reaction to some of his closing remarks and has had a number of requests for some kind of re-print of what he had to say.

The Captain is pleased to print what is considered to be the most important part of his talk; especially so in view of the times and events we are all witnessing today:

"I would hope that each of you will feel that you can support Farragut because you can have the confidence that there is a little school down on the banks of the Toms River where a responsible, disciplined, and ordered way of life is taught and expected; where obedience to laws and rules which exist for the good of the group is required, while at the same time respecting the right of individuals properly to question and seek change; where privilege, recognition, and rights must be earned rather than bestowed; where respect for custom, tradition, and person is expected; where drum beats not beatniks are valued; where duty to country is taught and expected; where the flag is saluted, not sullied and burned."

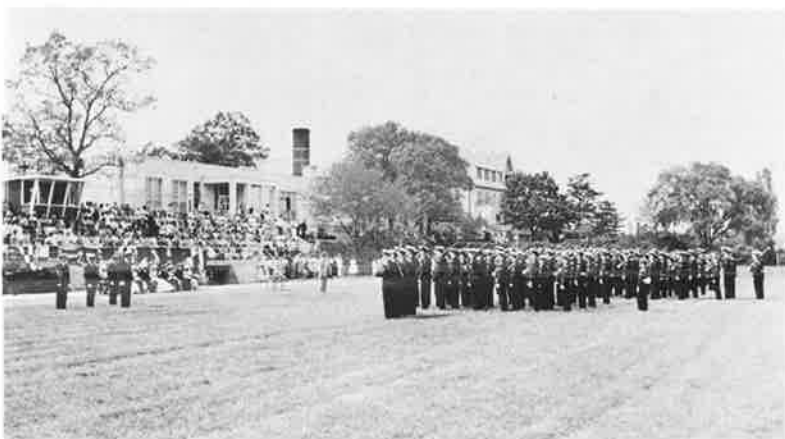

A new 75-car parking lot has been constructed by the Academy opposite the varsity baseball field and the Library building.

The lot is 250 x 125 feet in size, it holds three rows of 25 cars each, is paved and lined, and has entrances and exits on two sides. These are located on Radnor and Huntington Avenues. The entrances have brick piers similar to those that have been added to the campus during recent years, and low-growing shrubbery has been planted on the corners of the lot, as well as at the entrances.

The lot will be particularly convenient during major events that are held at the Academy throughout the year, and it will, in addition, eliminate safety hazards that used to exist with cars that parked at the corner of Radnor and Hillside Avenues during baseball games.

Parents' Assoc. Meets 2 Objectives

The Farragut Parents' Association was able to accomplish its two major objectives for the 1966-67 year, and there is still a possibility that the remaining five minor programs will receive some assistance once the Executive Committee has met and decided what action to take with the balance of funds remaining in the treasury.

Of significant importance was the installation of a completely automatic water-sprinkling system at the varsity baseball field at a cost of \$3500. The system has a master control located in the Maintenance building, and it has been laid out so that it will cover the entire area of the field when water is needed.

The Association also has \$6,000 to apply toward the accoustical treatment of Robison Hall, the large gymnasium. This project was recommended by the Headmaster in an effort to improve the accoustics in the large hall.

The remaining five objectives of the past year's program include: Alumni Student Aid Fund, Marine Museum Fund, Distinguished Guests Program Series, Faculty Fund for Advanced Study, and Headmaster's Discretionary Fund.

While these objectives were part of the program, the Committee decided to concentrate on the two major projects and allocate funds to these five if and when monies were available.

New Carpeting, Gifts to Museum

The Marine Museum, located in Farragut Hall, has a new look these days. Wall to wall carpeting, of the outdoor-indoor variety, was laid in the museum area and extended through the entire length to the Naval Science Office, which adjoins it. The finished appearance lends a dignified and impressive air to the department.

Captain F. N. Klein, former Director of Naval Science, reported that during the past six months several new additions to the Museum have been received. These include two U. S. Navy Cutlasses (1862) and two World War II Japanese rifles, donated by Alfred Weisbecker '39; three cannon balls (grape shot) from Admiral Perry's ship at the Battle of Lake Erie, donated by Stephen Emerick; two drum tables, decorated as Revolutionary War field drums, given by Frank P. Wendt '42; a framed photograph and original letter written by Admiral Farragut in 1866, by Mr. and Mrs. Herbert E. Walmsley; and two souvenirs of the Viet Nam War donated by LT Wm. R. Masciangelo, USMC '62.

The souvenirs include an enlisted man's belt taken from an NVA soldier who was killed by Lt. Masciangelo's platoon in a fire fight, and a pack that belonged to another NVA soldier who had crept to within 10 yards of his position and was about to shoot him in the back when his radio operator turned around in time to fell the enemy soldier. Both incidents occurred in the Dong Ha area of the DMZ earlier this year. LT. Masciangelo is with the 3rd Marine Division.

An Alumnus Speaks Out!

A letter received by Alumni Secretary Bill Masciangelo merits reprinting in this issue of the Capstan because it represents the thinking of a segment of American youth that gives courage to others for the future of our country.

The letter was written by PVT George G. Brown on July 29th from Fort Dix, N. J.

Dear Mr. Masciangelo:

Thank you very much for your prompt reply to my previous letter. I appreciate the encouragement you expressed very much.

I regret that I have not been too active an alumnus. However, I find I have more a sense of belonging for Farragut than I do for the college I graduated from this past June.

In the future I do intend to participate more. I am quite interested in the future of Farragut and intend to help it fulfill the goals that helped me in the four years I spent there.

In these times of draft card burners, mass civil disobedience, and warfare far from home, it is more important than ever to create responsible citizens. It may be presumptuous for a person of my age to speak about responsibilities of Americans, for I have not yet voted in a Presidential election. I am, however, aware of how fortunate I have been in having a good education. I am also aware that I have a definite responsibility to utilize the potential of that education both for my benefit and the benefit of others. A major part of that potential depends upon having an environment in which to express it. It was because of that that I enlisted into the Army rather than simply waiting to be drafted.

By voluntarily enlisting for a longer term of service, and choosing to become an officer, my conscience rests better. It may not actually be a great contribution, but I will feel I have done my part in preserving the environment I alluded to previously. Preserving it for myself, my family, and for all other Americans.

I know that Farragut definitely helped me in understanding life. I hope that it will continue to help many generations of young Americans in understanding our way of life and the heritage we must always fulfill.

I hope this letter does not seem pretentious or immature. I mean it to be an expression of some of the values I hold, some of which I learned at Farragut.

Farragut Fund Exceeds \$10,000 Mark; 394 Donors Support 10 Objectives

"Farragut Associates" Give \$3506 to Fund

A special organization of interested members of the Farragut Family, who were interested in giving \$100 or more to the Farragut Fund, was established for the first time during the 1966-67 campaign.

The Farragut Fund for 1966-67, with a goal of \$12,000 and a program of ten objectives, has produced a total of \$10,159.87 from 394 persons to give the Alumni Association's annual campaign the largest amount ever raised during the youthful history of the Fund.

There were some significant and encouraging signs for the future of the Fund, even though the goal was not reached. For instance. This year's Fund total was \$602.87 larger than the previous year. While the total number of donors decreased from 400 to 394, the resulting average gift rose from \$23.89 to \$25.78, an increase of \$1.89. The category of Past Parents, Corporations, and Others showed the greatest improvement, in terms of dollars, this year. Sixty-four gifts were received for a total of \$2494.88, compared with \$1809 last year.

The Class of 1934 has won the Theobald Alumni Fund Trophy for the second consecutive year. Last year was the first for the "Pioneer" Class, and, again, this year's Class Agent, Robert S. Osborne, will receive the trophy for his class at Homecoming Day ceremonies on Nov. 4. The Class showed a 3.85% increase in %-of-participation to lead the Class of 1937 by 3.97%. Jack Van Gelder was Class Agent for '37.

Donors to the Fund were permitted for the first time to indicate to which of the ten objectives they wished their gifts allocated. The results were quite interesting. The "Unrestricted" category received the most money (\$6900.87), while the other objectives were checked for the following amounts:

Alumni Student Aid Fund (\$1253.75), Alumni Library Shelf (\$289.25), Military Proficiency Awards (\$88.50), Faculty Fund for Advanced Study (\$170.55), Headmaster's Discretionary Fund (\$420), Farragut Marine Museum (\$207), Distinguished Guests Program Series (\$95), Music Fund (\$231.15), Electric Scoreboard (\$117.50), and Recreation Fund (\$186.30).

The Alumni Executive Board is scheduled to meet soon to make the proper and necessary appropriations, based on the primary needs to the Association and the Academy, and the total amount of funds available.
