New Facilities Permit Day Students For First Time In School's History

After many years of requests from local residents, and since the advent of the new academic facilities at the Academy, day students have been accepted for the first time in the School's history. A total of 15 have begun classes for the 1969-70 term. The Florida school in St. Petersburg has had day students for a number of years.

In making the announcement of the change in policy by the Academy's Board of Trustees, Captain Raven O. Dodge, Headmaster, explained that many residents in the surrounding communities had voiced an interest in having their sons attend Farragut, but lack of classroom facilities, in particular, has prevented the Academy to accept Cadets on this basis. "Since we have completed the addition to DuPont Hall, and have made major changes in that building to improve the facilities there, we are in a much better situation to handle these new students," he said.

Day Cadets may elect to participate in the NJROTC program, intramural, varsity and junior varsity athletics, or any other Academy club and activity programs. Election of athletic participation must be made on a season basis, and NJROTC on an annual basis.

Day students may remain at the Academy after classes for optional elective activities, extra help in academic work, or the use of the library. They are eligible for all school, club, and class offices, and for any of the Academy awards and distinctions, including the Honor School appointments. They are not, however, eligible for cadet officer-ship.

These students will be required to meet the Academy's requirements in Naval Science for graduation, and this may be done any year prior to graduation. They will not wear their uniforms except while at the Academy or going to and from it, and they will be able to change and keep their uniforms in lockers assigned to them in a special area of DuPont Hall.

While at the Academy, Day Cadets will be subject to all Academy rules and regulations, and they will be responsible for conforming to regulations governing personal grooming and the proper wearing of the uniform.

New Academic Center In Use As School Year Begins

With the completion of the new academic building that is now part of the DuPont Hall complex, plus major changes in the existing facilities of DuPont Hall itself, all scholastic activities are centered in the one area, with two exceptions. These are the three classrooms in Clark Hall for the Lower School, and the Naval Science classrooms housed in Farragut Hall.

The three story annex to DuPont is currently in use, and it contains a new library on the top floor, four combination classroom-laboratory facilities for chemistry, physics, biology and earth science on the second floor, and five classrooms and a foreign languages lab on the lower level.

The library is completely furnished with modern walnut furniture and shelving, and the floor is covered with wall-to-wall pumpkin-colored carpeting. A reading room adjoins the main library area, which also has a work room and office for the librarian, plus toilet facilities.

The science areas are fully equipped with the latest equipment, and they will provide excellent services to students working in this field. There is also a dark room on this floor. The language lab contains sixteen new individual booths and a control unit, and there is a possibility that additional booths will be added once the old units have been checked for possible modernization and conversion to the present style in use.

Many changes have also been made in DuPont Hall that should make for better administration of the academic program. On the main classroom deck, rooms 1 and 3, and 9 and 11, have been combined into individual large classrooms. In addition to more room for students, each teacher in these rooms will have a study niche, with desk, files and shelving. A new Battalion Office has been converted from former classroom No. 14, with panelling, new desks, and all of the necessary controls to operate the daily schedule of the Academy.

raise funds to equip and furnish the new library in the recently-completed academic building.

When the final event was ended, the Association was able to turn over \$17,770 to the Academy to meet the cost of the furnishings, and, in addition, to give approximately \$3,000 to the Farragut Fund toward five of its objectives: Marine Museum Fund, Student Aid Fund, Distinguished Guests Series, Faculty Fund for Advanced Study, and the Headmaster's Discretionary Fund.

The Association had 86.1% of all Parents of the Cadet Corps enrolled as active members during the 1968-69 term, which was .1% better than the previous year.

The former "Barr" Office has been made into a "head" for Cadets, and classroom 13 is now a guest lounge for relatives and friends visiting Cadets. The Director of Activities Office has been expanded by making Room 5 into a file room.

On the lower level there is a Lower School Science classroom-lab, a faculty room, a classroom, and an area where vending machines and lockers are available for use by Cadets. Day students will be assigned lockers in this area, also.

The Naval Science Dept. is relinquishing Room M, in the bottom of Farragut Hall, for expansion of the Marine Museum, and it has acquired the former faculty lounge and part of the biology classroom-lab area for two additional classrooms for instruction purposes. Room "O" remains at the lower level next to the Museum.

Perhaps one of the most important developments from all of these changes is the fact that each member of the faculty now has his own classroom and all of the necessary equipment to help him do an efficient job.

Cum Laude Society Now Has 91 Members

Since the installation of the Cum Laude Society chapter here on campus on March 4, 1961, a total of 91 Cadets, Faculty, Alumni, and honored guests have been inducted as members. The original charter membership of 16, included 7 members of the Alumni Association. At present there are 3 Faculty, 13 Honorary, and 75 Cadets who are members, in addition to the charter members. The Society is modeled on Phi Beta Kappa, but is for secondary schools.

Admiral Cramer '40 Addresses Class Of '69 At 36th Commencement Exercises

Seventy-seven more graduates joined the Alumni Association ranks on June 1, when the 36th annual commencement exercises were held here at the Academy in Robison Hall. The youthful grads heard a former Cadet, Rear Admiral Shannon D. Cramer, Jr., USN, Class of '40, tell them of the great need by the Country for young men with dedication, resolve and purpose to continue to keep the nation strong and growing.

"I am sure," he said, "that when I, in 1940, and Alan Shepard, in 1941, sat in the audience during our commencement programs here at Farragut, that neither of us had any knowledge of the opportunities we would have to serve the United States and to contribute to its security and development."

Diplomas were presented to the First Classmen by the Admiral, as well as to 25 eighth grade graduates, during the program.

Rev. A. G. Van Dyke, Academy Chaplain, delivered the benediction and invocation, Captain R. O. Dodge, Headmaster, presented the awards, and Cadets Stephen P. Gangemi and William D. Almy were salutatorian and valedictorian respectively.

Admiral Cramer, Colonel F. H. Berry, Sr., a member of the Academy's Board of Trustees, and three Cadets were inducted into the Cum Laude Society. Bowen '54 Ran To Olympics In 1968



On Oct. 3, 1968, John Bowen '54 and eleven other runners left City Hall in Houston, Tex., for a 1096 mile relay run to Mexico City and the Summer Olympic Games. The run took six days to complete, with each runner running one hour twice a day.

The event was sponsored by the Houston Jaycees to promote international brotherhood and physical fitness through running. The group, called the "Chaparrales" (Roadrunners), carried proclamations and greetings from President Lyndon Johnson and Houston Mayor Louie Welch. In the six weeks prior to leaving, each runner ran about 700 miles in training.

The group also included four drivers, two campers, and an International Scout, which trailed the runners. After viewing several days of the Olympics, the group returned home a little lighter in weight, but with a feeling of accomplishment.

John has been running for several years now and logs about 3000 miles per year. During the past few months prior to the Olympics run, he placed second in a 26 mile race and won a two mile and a ten mile cross country championship. He also participated in the Boston Marathon race this past April 21.

John graduated from Georgia Tech in 1961. He is employed as Regional Manager for Welsh Mfg. Co. of Providence, R.I. He is president of the Sharpstown Civic Ass'n., and a member of the American Society of Safety Engineers, YMCA, Roadrunners Club of America, and Gulf AAU. He lives at 8831 Trosdon Dr., Houston, with his wife, Joyce, and three children.

Current Farragut Fund At 69.4% Of Goal As Committee Seeks \$12,000

With a minimum goal of \$12,000 set for this year's Farragut Fund, MAJGEN Joseph L. Dickman, USAF '35, National Chairman, has reported a total of \$8332.92 has been raised to date (September 13), leaving a balance of \$3667.08 to be raised before the current annual campaign can be termed a success.

The total received has come from 227 Alumni and 57 Parents and Friends of the Academy, with the result that the average gift is \$29.34. The General revealed that 55.73% of those who participated last year have repeated up to this time, and he expressed confidence that if the balance of those who gave last year would do so again, there would be no difficulty in reaching the goal established by the Alumni Association for the 1968-69 drive.

Objectives of the Fund include the Alumni Student Aid Fund, equipping one of the four Science classroom-labs in the new academic building, Military Proficiency Awards, Faculty Fund for Advanced Study, the Marine Museum, Headmaster's Discretionary Fund, Distinguished Guests Program Series, and the Alumni Office.

The primary objective, General Dickman said, is to try to complete the Marine Museum project, which was part of last year's campaign, also. The estimated cost of re-designing and renovating the present facility at the lower level of Farragut Hall, is estimated to cost in the neighborhood of \$7500. \$3000 has been put in escrow (savings certificates earning 5 1/2% with the Jersey Shore S & L Assoc., Toms River) from last year's campaign, and it is hopeful that the balance of \$4500 will be available to finish the job this year.

Of equal importance is the Science Classroom-Lab and the Student Aid Fund, General Dickman explained. "We all know how important science is today and how necessary it is to have good teachers with adequate equipment to teach students in this field. With the areas available in the new annex to DuPont Hall for this purpose, we know that the job can be done, and we must do everything possible to help in this direction. As for Student Aid, anyone in a position to help qualified and deserving young men with financial aid so that they can attend the Academy, must be aware of the frustration one experiences when there aren't enough funds to go around."

General Dickman urged all Alumni and Past Parents to play an important role in the development of the Academy and in its mission to try to produce responsible and able citizens for the good of the nation, by becoming a participant in this year's Farragut Fund.

Other officers of the Fund Committee working with General Dickman this year include M. Girard Kelly '57 (General Chairman), Stewart D. Woolley '44 (Director for Alumni), and David Yoho (Director for Past Parents). Mr. Yoho's son, David, graduated from Farragut in 1968. In addition, there are 35 Class Agents assisting them.



To Teach Science Instead of Music

Dayton G. Newton, Head of the Music Department for the past sixteen years, has finally stepped down from the podium and will not devote any more time to musical activities at the Academy. The decision to lay down his famous baton came after he received advice from his doctor to give up this demanding work because of an ear ailment that would become worse if he continued to subject his hearing to the daily schedule of teaching and leading the various musical groups that are part of the Department.

Mr. Newton has, in addition to teaching private lessons on practically every kind of instrument, directed the concert band, marching band, glee club and dance orchestra. Further, he was advisor to the Music and Arts Club. He has also served as First Class advisor for a number of years.

Beginning this month Mr. Newton will spend his time as a member of the faculty teaching earth science, for which he is fully qualified. He is looking forward to this experience with the enthusiasm of a college freshman, and he already is talking about having a fully-equipped weather station at the Academy which members of his classes will learn to operate and interpret. A natural teacher, imparting knowledge to young men, no matter what the subject is, will make the transition from music to science an easy one.

Gonzales Replaces

Replacing Mr. Newton as head of the Music Dept., will be John A. Gonzales. Mr. Gonzales was Director of the Music Dept. and instructor in Humanities at the Marion Institute, Marion, Alabama, for the past two years. While there he handled all of the duties of the Band and chorus. Prior to that he taught for Hillsborough County Schools, Florida, was a free-lance pianist, organist and composer-arranger. He has also taught English, Spanish, music and drama at Hamilton Catholic H. S., Hamilton, Ohio, and in 1961 he was composer-in-residence for the Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park.

Mr. Gonzales holds a degree of Bachelor of Music in Theory and Composition from the U. of Cincinnati, and has done graduate work there in musicology. In college he was a member of Phi Mu Alpha and Alpha Psi Omega. He was born in Tampa, Fla.

Court, Rifle Squads Best During 1968-69

The varsity basketball and rifle teams were the two best athletic clubs at the Academy during the 1968-69 term, as the court men produced a 15-5 record for their efforts and the shooters fired a 15-2 mark.

Coached by Ray Lynch, the Sailors beat teams like Newark Academy, Croydon Hall, Stevens Academy, Delbarton, Pennington, Blair, St. Joseph's H.S. and Pingry. They were led by co-captains Jamie Deans and Wayne Kennard, who posted 17.5 and 17.8 averages respectively.

Captain Jack Hirst and Coach Darwin Larson guided the Rodmen to their impressive record, as they beat Toms River H.S., Xavier, Bordentown, Jr. Essex Troop, Red Bank Rifle Club, Christian Brothers Academy, Somerset, Central Jersey R. C. and New York M. A. In most instances, Farragut fired against these teams more than once.

In other sports, the 1968 Varsity football team had a 2-6 record, Varsity soccer earned a 1-2-5 mark, and Varsity wrestling won 3 and lost 6. Varsity baseball posted a .500 mark with 5 wins and 5 losses, and Varsity track finished with 3 victories and four losses. Co-captain Wayne Kennard, hurdles acc. won the award for best all-around performer at the N. J. States meet, in which he took three firsts.

New Computer Service Is Founded By M. Ludwig

A dramatic computer service to provide doctors with immediate access to millions of individual medical records was founded early this year by Martin Ludwig, Class of 1954. Known as Medicron World Medical Data Bank, it is a division of Command Control, Inc., Wayne, N.J. Ludwig is president of the organization.

The service has as its basis a specially designed computerized system for recording and storing subscribers' medical histories. Access for the physician is by phone, at any time, from anywhere in the world. "A better chance to survive an illness or accident is what the Bank offers," said Ludwig. "In an emergency the attending physician can get the information he needs any hour of the day or night as fast as he can make a phone call."

Martin holds a B.S. degree in Industrial Engineering from Fairleigh Dickinson U., where he also did graduate work in business management and went on to become an Industrial Engineer for ITT from 1957 to 1961. Prior to joining Command Control, he was affiliated with the UNIVAC Div. of Sperry Rand.

Remembered mostly for his great love of athletics, his keen wit, and his annual performance as master-of-ceremonies of the Monogram Club dinners, he was the father of three Farragut graduates: Bill '38, Jim '39, and Ed '44. He maintained an active interest in the Academy since 1936, and he was a consistent supporter of the Farragut Fund. "Pop" Ward was, in the true sense, an outstanding member of the Farragut Family.

The five include Alfred F. Combi '41, Edward H. Garis '42, Curtis J. Harrison '45, Robert J. Cameron '49 and Alexander Lupfer '54.

Fred Combi died at the Toms River Community Memorial Hospital on Oct. 16, 1968, after a long illness. He played varsity football, basketball and baseball as a Cadet, served during World War II with the U. S. Marine Corps, and had worked for the Red Lion Inn, Bricktown, N.J. for the past fifteen years. He was single.

Ed Garis's death occurred on August 21, 1967, and he was a construction engineer with the Chicago Bridge & Iron Co. at the time. Married and the father of three children, he was a graduate of Lafayette College, a member of the American Society of Engineers and Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and served in the U. S. Air Force during World War II. He was 41.

The death of Curt Harrison was the result of an accident in Holmdel, N.J., on May 17, 1968. He was a resident of Middletown, was married, the father of five children, and was president of C. J. Harrison & Partners, Inc., marketing communications, N.Y.C. He attended New York U. and served in the Navy.

The second Farragut Viet Nam casualty, Bob Cameron was killed in action on January 28, 1969, as a major in the U. S. Air Force, a U. S. Naval Academy graduate, where he won fame in football and track, he was married and the father of three sons. He had had 175 missions in V.N. at the time of his death, and had won the Distinguished Flying Cross on his second mission.

The only information available on Alex Lupfer is that he was killed on a training flight at Kingsville NAS, Texas, on May 14, 1967. He graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy in 1958. "Mac" was a member of the 3rd Co. while a Cadet at Farragut, he played varsity football, was a member of the Monogram Club, and held a 2 P.O. rate.

Important Gifts By Alumni Aid AFA

Five important alumni gifts received in recent months include a framed original letter and photograph of Admiral David G. Farragut, a 15-foot open launch, an electric organ, a recently published book, and a large full color aerial view of the Academy campus.

The Farragut letter, dated July 13, 1863, was written by Admiral Farragut, ordering the transportation of four wounded sailors and the assistant surgeon of the USS NEW LONDON to New Orleans for care and treatment. Both the letter and picture are matted with attractive blue, and the frame is in antique gold. The gift was made by Frank P. Wendt '42 and is the second gift of this kind given to the Academy.

John J. Fox, Jr., also of the Class of 1942, presented the Academy with a large Wurlitzer electric organ, complete with separate speaker and chimes. The organ has been placed permanently in Robison Hall and will be used there for special programs and events.

The waterfront area benefited by the gift of the launch by James P. Bradley '59. Powered by a 25 h.p. Gray marine engine, the hull was built in Norway and is constructed of cedar and oak.

The library received a personally autographed copy of "Ten Texans in Gray" from Arthur E. Gilligan '39, author of one of the biographies on John Robert Taylor. Mr. Gilligan has written a number of other articles, including "The Battle of Valcour Island," which appeared in the Naval Institute Proceedings of October 1967.

Of use to the Public Relations Office is the large full-color aerial view of the campus that was given by Jesse Randall '52, a Marine Corps major and pilot. Jesse was visiting with his father-in-law last Spring, in Red Bank, N.J., and accompanied him on a photo flight over the Toms River area, and prevailed on him to take this up-to-date and valuable picture.

More Raised In 1967-68 Farragut Fund Alumni Campaign Than Ever Before

What happened during the 1967-68 Farragut Fund campaign? The Alumni Association has announced while it fell short of its goal of \$12,000, it raised the largest amount ever raised by the Fund in a given year since its inception in 1947.

A total of \$11,271.95 was realized from 438 donors, resulting in an average gift of \$25.73 when the final figures were tabulated and recorded. 17.23% of the Alumni participated, giving a total of \$7644.95, while the balance of \$3627 came from 63 Past Parents, Friends and Corporations with Matching Gift programs.

The funds received were used primarily for the operation and maintenance of the Alumni Office, the Student Aid Fund, renovation of the Marine Museum, the presentation of four awards for Military Proficiency, Recreation Fund for the Cadets, Distinguished Guests Series, the purchase of a portable lectern with built-in sound system, the Headmaster's Discretionary Fund, the Library Fund, the Faculty Fund for Advanced Study, and the purchase of a theatre spotlight with color wheel.

Not enough funds were raised to complete the Marine Museum project, so work on this was delayed and \$3000 was placed in escrow in the form of time deposit certificates paying 5 1/2%, until sufficient monies were realized in order to complete entire job. The Museum project was given No. 1 priority among the objectives of the current Farragut Fund of 1968-69 campaign.

New Warfare Tactics Written By Alumnus

Commander Peveril Blundell, USN, Class of 1948, helped to write a new page in the history of naval warfare in Viet Nam's Mekong Delta while he was there during 1968 and part of 1969. The U. S. Naval Academy graduate was in command of one of only four squadrons in the River Assault Flotilla One, his unit consisting of 43 specially designed gunboats that prowled delta waterways in search of main force Viet Cong units.

Pev was with Squadron 13 since its birth in Coronado, Calif., where he commissioned the unit and undertook to make it operational. Four days after its arrival in Viet Nam, the Squadron was handed its first assignment: strike operations against Viet Cong units in the Rung Sat Special Zone, a huge swamp near Saigon.

From that modest beginning, Pev's squadron grew in size and travelled the length and breadth of the delta in search of the enemy, and compiled an enviable record. He described his men as "prepared" and not in need of pep talks to do a good job. "This is dead serious business. They have a job to do and they do it well," he said.
