Some of these include a new movie screen for the auditorium valued at \$262 by Mr. Bert Yelin; a gift of \$1200 to be used to purchase gym equipment by Mr. Wm. G. Wrightson, and an additional gift of 97 shares of A & P stock, worth approximately \$1100, for general purposes; \$200 to the Athletic Dept. by Mr. John Koczwara, father of Charles Koczwara '68; \$120 to the Farragut Parents' Assoc. by Mr. Charles W. Stirrup, and an additional \$500 by Mr. and Mrs. Stirrup to be applied to the Oceanology program.

Also, \$75 to the Headmaster's Discretionary Fund by Robert E. Fielding of Acorn Enterprises, S. Toms River; 3000 feet of manila and nylon line for the waterfront, worth between \$350 and \$400 by Mr. Rowland W. Sailer; an anonymous gift by two Alumni of 122 new books worth approximately \$900 to the Library; the repairing of one Arrow sloop with insulating material by Mr. Edward B. Vansant; a total of 10 books, worth approximately \$50 by Dr. Gerard K. Nash '44, Amarillo, Texas; a book, "The

Annual Commencement Exercises Held On June 8

Thirty-seven seniors and 22 eighth grade members were graduated at the School's 41st annual commencement exercises here on June 8. More than 1000 persons attended the colorful exercises held in Robison Hall.

The commencement address was delivered by the Hon. Anthony M. Livoti, New York Supreme Court Justice and father of Anthony M. Livoti, Jr., Class of '66. Judge Livoti served as president of the Parents' Association during his son's final year of attendance.

Cadets Alexander Sorokin, Flushing, N.Y., and D. Richard Erdmann, Pine Beach, presented the valedictory and salutatory respectively, and the invocation was given by CDR Robert W. Lankford, Academy chaplain.

Captain Norman C. Farnlof, presiding at his first commencement since assuming the headmastership last September, announced the various awards and diploma recipients, and asked Captain Raven O. Dodge, headmaster-emeritus to deliver his famous diploma "charge" prior to their presentation by Judge Livoti and Captain W. Kable Russell, Board president. Captain Farnlof said he thought the "charge" was an established tradition at Farragut and wanted it continued at each commencement.

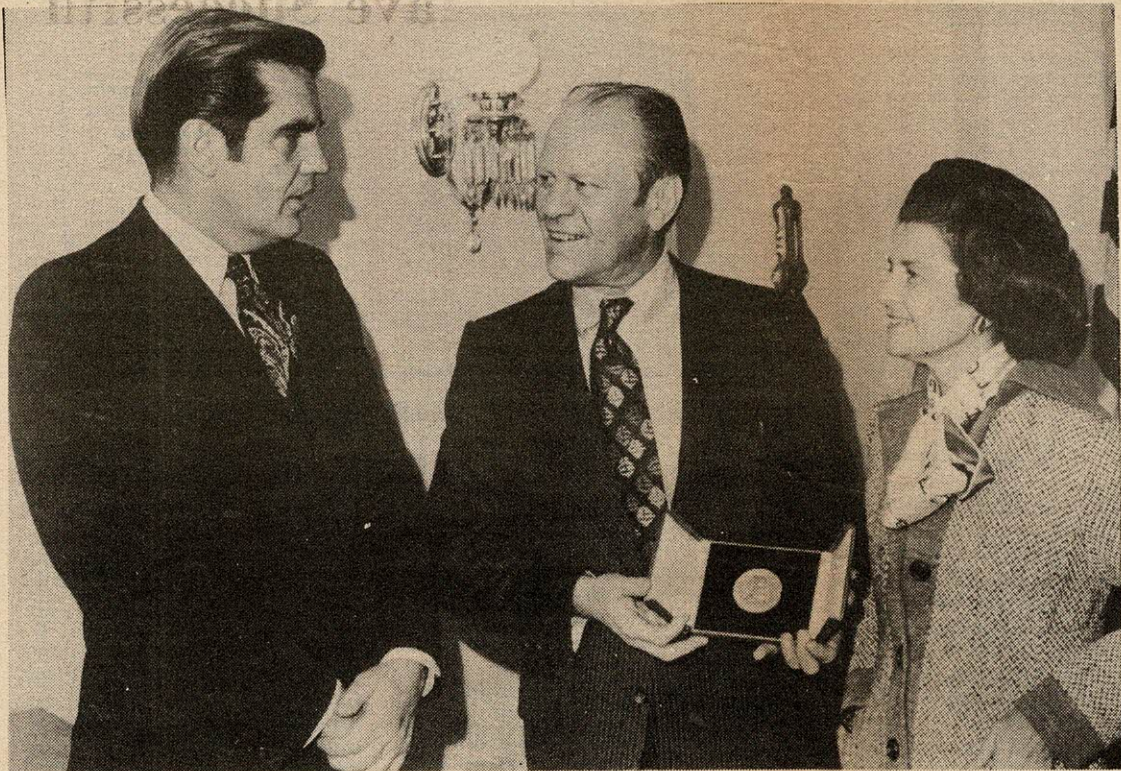

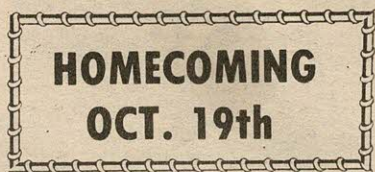

High Rating Given Navy Inspection

The 1974 annual inspection of the Academy by the Navy Dept., under the provisions of the NJROTC and Honor Naval School, has resulted in a numerical grade of 98.4 and an adjective grade of OUTSTANDING, according to CDR Gerald L. Wilda, USN, Ret., Director of Naval Science.

Conducted on April 25 by CDR Ernest D. Onorato, USN, Regional Navy Youth Programs Officer, Third Naval District, the official report received indicated that Farragut continued to maintain its high standards, and that the overall annual inspection was again considered to be outstanding.

The inspection covered Administration, NJROTC enrollment, Public Affairs, Facilities, equipment, supply and accounting, Training, and Personnel inspection and review.

"The performance of the cadets, the facilities, and the overall program are considered to be ideal and would serve as a fine example to any school in the program," CDR Onorato wrote in his report to the Chief of Naval Education and Training. "During every phase of the inspection, the cadets consistently exhibited a high esprit, and it was easy to see that each cadet was proud of his company, his unit, and the Academy. Although it was extremely difficult to select the best company during the personnel inspection, the First Company won the honor. It should be noted, however, that the other two companies were also outstanding and could easily compete with any other unit in the Fourth Naval District."

Zener Retires; Vet. Appointed

LCDR Harold B. Zener, head of the Music Dept. since 1970 has retired from his post effective June 8. He and Mrs. Zener hope to do more travelling in the future than they have been able to do in the past, he said.

LCDR Zener holds a B.S. in Music from Indiana State University, Pa., and previously taught at North Penn School, Lansdale, Pa., from 1954 until 1970. Quiet, unassuming, and efficient, he slowly built the Marching Band into an outstanding unit here at the Academy, and his Glee Clubs showed considerable talent even though they were smaller in memberships than some of those of the past. For the past two years the Band swept all three prizes in the annual Loyalty Day parades for outstanding performances.

William H. Sisson, Jr. will replace LCDR Zener this fall. A Navy veteran, he is a graduate of the Navy's School of Music, and holds a degree in music education from the U. of Delaware. He is proficient on all brass instruments and has taught at both private and public schools in the Delaware area. Mr. Sisson is single and will live in Radford Hall.

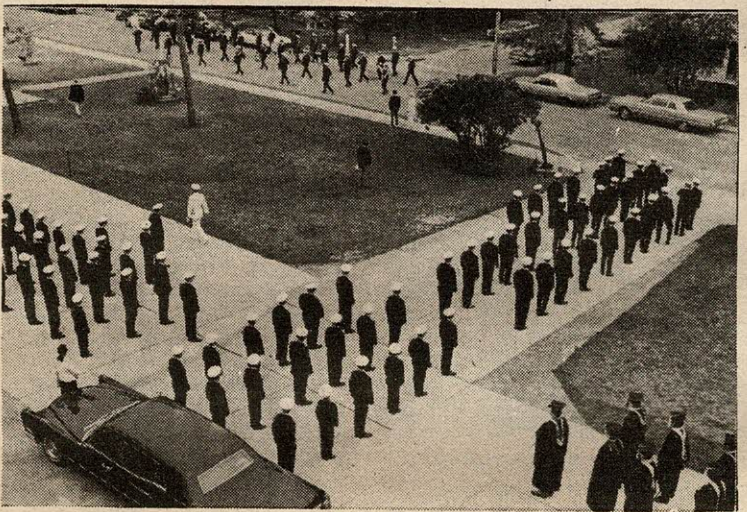

Teacher Dies; Trident Dedicated

LCDR William H. Kelly, one of the most popular instructors on the Academy staff in recent years, died suddenly on Sept. 3, 1973, at the age of 46.

A graduate of Yale University, LCDR Kelly was a Navy veteran, and then went into the wholesale supply business for a number of years before deciding to enter the teaching profession. In addition to teaching freshman and sophomore English, he served as an advisor to the Galleon Staff, Booster Club, Chess Club, Cinematography Club, Photo Club, Shepard Hall Committee, and Flight Space Club during his six years of service.

The 1974 Trident was dedicated in his honor and memory by this year's First Class.

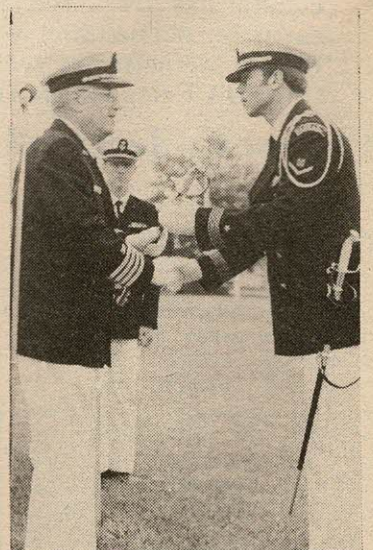
The program is sponsored annually by the local American Legion post.

I have just finished my first academic year as Headmaster, and for me it has been a good year of "settling in". Your alumni support and encouragement are needed by those of us on the Academy staff today who must steer what you know to be a difficult course through these churned up seas of life today. To determine what specifically constitutes change and changelessness is not always easy!

I look forward to meeting many of you over the years ahead. Our common bond is Farragut, and I want Farragut always to remain an educational experience that can be identified readily by alumni of all times and in all places. We join together in mutual concern for seeing to it that Farragut continues to offer a vital program in service to American education.

Raw Courage.....An Inspiration To All

Tragedy struck an unusual young man suddenly on April 19, when Cadet Wayne M. McVicar failed to get up after high jumping during the first varsity track meet of the season. Exactly how and what happened might never be known, but the fact that he was paralyzed from his neck to his toes was of grave consequence. The rumors flew fast and furious that Wayne would never walk again, that he would be limited to a bed, a chair, and to a life of physical inactivity. Many of the rumors bore testimony to the gravity of the injury as the weeks passed by and he continued to be confined at the Toms River Community Hospital.

While Wayne was receiving medical care and treatment and there were signs of life appearing in the crippled areas of his body, the one fact everyone overlooked is the raw courage and determination that is part of his make up. Perhaps there were those who knew him intimately and better than others who were not sur-

prised at his display of doggedness, and by the statement that he made when he said, "I'm going to walk up to get my diploma on June 8th."

Later, Wayne was moved to the Naval Hospital in Phila., for more comprehensive and specialized treatment, and he continued to amaze everyone as first his one arm and leg, and then the other limbs gradually began to show even greater mobility and use. To the surprise of most of us, last minute arrangements were made and he was able to be with his classmates for the closing exercises of the year in Robison Hall. True, he was in a wheel chair, and true, he had to be helped both coming and going, but when the name of WAYNE McVICAR, Cum Laude, was called, he stood up from his chair and walked five paces forward to personally receive his diploma on his own two feet.

Needless to say, the hall was charged with emotion and ad-

miration and wonder. His classmates were in open admiration and pride, and the eyes of many were filled with tears of joy as this remarkable young man clearly showed what a mind is able to accomplish. At the final formation following graduation he was given a certificate that he earned, awarding him a four-year scholarship at a college NROTC institution. During graduation he was presented the Admiral Farragut Academy medal, given to the most all-around First Classman in every phase of school life.

Wayne is still at the Naval Hospital. He has undergone a spinal operation and the final prognosis has not yet been determined. We know that the future is still not certain and that it will continue to be filled with challenges and limitations, but there is one thing we know that if it is humanly possible, Wayne McVicar is going to do it!

What an inspiration to all of us who know him.

J. Duval '68 Plaque Hung

Last fall a plaque listing the names and years of all varsity football captains from 1934 until 1973 was erected in the lobby of Robison Hall in memory of the late John H. Duval '68. The cost of the plaque was raised by members of the Class of 1968 to perpetuate the memory of their classmate, fondly known as Duv.

In a letter written to the Class, Mr. John N. Duval, father said: "The establishment of the John H. Duval Memorial reaffirms our continuing and never ending pride in our son. On behalf of John's family, his mother, his sister, and myself, I extend our heartfelt thanks and appreciation for the honor and tribute you have bestowed upon him. Many of John's fondest memories were of Admiral Farragut Academy and of the experiences he shared there with you his classmates. Because you were such an important part of his life, your memorial to him is especially meaningful and greatly appreciated. Your remembrance of John is most comforting to us. Gentlemen, we thank you."

John was a student at Quinipac College at the time of his death, which occurred approximately a mile from home when his car struck a utility pole. His father indicated that he fell asleep while driving.

Port Jervis Is Port For "Doc"

Former Medical Officer Francis P. Doty is alive, quite active, and still writing eloquent letters from Port Jervis, N.Y., which he now calls his permanent port.

Those former Cadets who were at Farragut during 1939-40, and then from 1946 to 1960, will recall the retired Navy lieutenant, who served so long and well in the Hospital Corps prior to joining the Farragut staff in May of '39. "Doc," as most individuals referred to him, ran a tight, but efficient ship, during the more than 15 years he was on the Academy payroll. He was proud of his Sick Bay, and he followed a theory of President Theodore Roosevelt's, modified to apply to Farragut cadets: "The duty of the Medical Dept. is to keep as many Cadets at their desks as many hours as possible."

This highly endorsed policy by Headmaster Raven O. Dodge meant that a continous medical service was required in the Dispensary. It was accomplished by having dispensary treatment available 24 hours a day and regular formal Sick Calls twice a day, seven days a week. This schedule was carried out, resulting in a remarkably low sick rate and steadily decreasing rate from year to year under LT Doty's supervision.

As "Doc" wrote in one of the 1949 editions of the Alumni

Bulletin: "The good health standards have also been maintained by preventive medical measures in the nature of prophylactic vaccines; enforcement of a schedule that keeps boys occupied in healthful sports and activities, with little time for idle pursuits that lead to poor health and accidents."

"Doc" lives at One Ridge Ave., Port Jervis, N.Y. 12771, where he keeps house and cares for his widowed sister, who is now confined to a local nursing home. In a recent letter he wrote: "I still maintain a great interest in Farragut and my remaining friends and associates there, even though I have not been able to visit Pine Beach for the past 10 years because of my ailing sister. Mrs. Mills' untimely death was a great shock to me and I still recall in my mind her remarkable qualities and devotion."

When CAPT S. Robert Foley, USN '46 became commanding officer of the USS MIDWAY (CVA-41) on July 31, 1972, he was the 27th C.O. to hold that post in the 27-year history of the carrier.

He is married to the former Kathleen MacDonald of Scranton, Pa., and they have four children: Robert, Maureen, Brenda and Christopher.

Cadets Call Field Day A Success

The Corps of Cadets participated in a day-long field day on May 9, which produced plenty of competition, sore muscles, and a great deal of enjoyment. Sponsored by CDR Gerald Wilda, Director of Naval Science, the program pitted various class organization against one another in football, bombardment, Capture the Flag, softball, waterfront activities, tug-o-war, volleyball, three-legged marathon wheelbarrow race, relay races, inter-class buck-buck, tennis, and pool events.

Breaks of 15 minutes each were held during the morning and afternoon programs, and a noon barbeque was served in the area of the barbeque pit behind Robison Hall. Faculty and staff members assisted as game officials and supervisors of the various sports.

'73 Fund Campaign Fails To Meet Goal; Av. Gift Up

Despite an average gift increase of \$4.31 over last year, the 1973 Farragut Fund campaign fell short of its goal of \$22,500 by \$4400.07, according to a final report by Wm. R. Masciangelo '37, Alumni Secretary.

The total raised amounted to \$18,099.93 (down \$2,206.64), the number of donors was 392 (down 93), and the average gift was \$46.17 (up \$4.31). The number of new contributors (did not participate last year) was 59, compared with 109 in '72, and the percentage of repeaters for this year was 68.65 percent, down 8.55 percent from the previous year. While last year's campaign attained 112.81 percent of its goal of \$18,000, this year's effort reached only 80.44 percent of the \$22,500 objective.

In the special giving categories, the total produced fell from \$11,395 last year to \$11,025. There were 33 Farragut Associates (\$100 up) for \$3975; 1 Farragut Sponsor (\$300 up) for \$300; 5 Headmaster's Council (\$500 up) for \$2500; and 4 Farragut Fellows (\$1000 up) for \$4250. This means that 10 percent of the donors this year gave 66 percent of the total amount received. "While this is commendable," Masciangelo said, "it points out clearly the great importance that must be attached to the small donor. If we can increase the number of persons participating, the total dollar amount will take care of itself."

Top five classes in terms of percentage of participation were: 1934-20 percent; 1938 - 20 percent; 1945 - 19.41 percent; 1941 - 18.84 percent; and 1959 - 17.46 percent.

Top five classes in terms of best average gifts were: 1958 - \$345.00; 1951 - \$185.00; 1939 - \$127.50; 1942 - \$83.33; and 1937 - \$76.11.

Top five classes in terms of total amounts were: 1939 - \$1535; 1951 - \$1110; 1958 - \$1035; 1945 - \$1015; and 1938 - \$885.

Top five classes in terms of number of donors were: 1945 - 20; 1938 - 14; 1941 - 13; 1946 - 13; and 1949 - 13.

Of the eleven classes that figured in the top categories, the Classes of 1938 and 1945 appeared three times each, more times than any of the others.

The objectives of the Fund were for Student Aid Fund, Headmaster's Discretionary Fund, Faculty Fund for Advanced Study, Museum Fund, and the new Oceanology program.
