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VADM Foley '46 Warns

1980 Graduates Told Russia Not A Friend

Sylvester Robert Foley, Jr., Class of 1946, came "home" after 34 years and, despite his long absence, made a very favorable impact on everyone on campus the morning of Saturday, June 6. For it was Vice Admiral Foley, Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (OP-6), who returned to address the 47th annual commencement exercises in Robison Hall and impress the audience of Cadets, parents, friends and relatives attending the final program of the 1979-80 school year.

Most graduates who face an audience of Cadets are successful and enthusiastically acclaimed, and Admiral Foley was no exception as he recalled his time spent at Farragut and the many thoughts that went through his mind sitting in a similar audience listening to a commencement speaker.

In a serious vein he cautioned his listeners by telling them of his recent trip to Moscow for difficult negotiations with Soviet Navy officials. He told of unfriendly conversations, cold, grey, dreary atmospheres, bugged hotel rooms and visitors either escorted or followed. "Moscow," he said, "is not a place in which to relax. It is not cheerful. Anyone who thinks the Soviets are our friends or want to maintain the status quo, is either naive or very foolish."

The Admiral continued, "As you graduates move out into the world, I ask that you have faith in America and keep a sense of perspective and balance about our place in this world. Remember, too, that at this very moment thousands of Cubans are giving thanks for their newfound freedom and safety after their flight across the straits of Florida to America. At this moment more Vietnamese boat people are being picked up in the waters of the South China seas desperately hoping for life in America. Thousands of immigrants have, and are still seeking refuge and political asylum in America. For all of our weaknesses, for all of our ills, we are still the greatest, the strongest, and the kindest nation in the world. We are a land of

opportunity. We are a land of hope. We are a land of great natural wealth and most important of all, we are a land of the free! Never forget that we must stay this way!"

In an unusual display of enthusiastic reaction to a speaker, the entire audience rose to its feet to deliver a standing ovation.

Prior to his address, Admiral Foley and Thornley B. Wood, Jr. '38, were presented with the Distinguished Alumnus Award by Association president William P. Garwood '49. Foley was cited for his outstanding career with the Navy, and Wood was recognized as a leader in the corporate personnel field. He is Senior Vice President of the Penn Central Corp.

Also, the Alumni Association, in a surprise move, presented its Certificate of Merit to Mrs. Alice Todino, mother of Dr. Joel D. Todino '56, for having attended 28 consecutive commencement programs. Two of her grandsons, Keith and Glenn Whitehead, graduated in 1976 and 1978 respectively.

Captain Robert W. Matthies, Jr., Headmaster, officiated throughout the exercises, and he read the perennial "diploma charge" to the graduating class in the absence of the author and annual presenter, Captain Raven O. Dodge, Headmaster Emeritus.

The invocation and benediction were given by CDR Robert W. Lankford, Academy Chaplain, the salutatory was by Cadet Kenneth J. Marshon, Jr., and the valedictory delivered by Cadet George A.N. Stroup. Inducted into the Academy's Cum Laude Society were Cadets Donald Chase, Newtown, Pa., Thomas Ransom, Honolulu, Hawaii, and Marshon, New Hyde Park, N.Y. Admiral Foley was made an honorary member during the ceremony.

The academic procession, singing of the Alma Mater, playing of the National Anthem, and the tossing of caps by the Class of 1980, concluded the Academy's traditional and colorful graduation exercises.

Alumni Will Honor Captain Klein At Nov. 1 Homecoming

The 1980 Homecoming Day set for Nov. 1 will honor Captain Frederick N. Klein, Jr., USN, Ret., present member of the Academy's teaching staff and Curator of the Marine Museum. In addition, it will observe special reunions of Classes from 1935 through 1975, as alumni gather for their 45th, 40th, 35th, 30th, 25th, 20th, 15th, 10th, and 5th anniversary get-togethers.

An invitation to attend the big fall weekend will be mailed to all members of the Alumni Association, but special emphasis will be placed on the reunions of the five-year classes beginning

with 1935's 45th anniversary.

Captain Klein joined the Academy staff during the 1964-65 school year, coming aboard first as Assistant Director of Naval Science and Rifle Coach. He later became Commandant of Cadets, a post that he held for 13 years until he resigned because of health reasons. He devoted a year to the Curator's post (a post that he held in conjunction with that of Commandant), getting the Museum into good order and having the new Quarterdeck area built. He has always enjoyed a good relationship with Alumni, and was responsible for appointing

an all-Alumni membership to the Museum's Board of Directors.

Actually, Homecoming time may be considered a weekend of fun, for the first event on the calendar will be the pre-Homecoming get-together at Howard Johnson's Legend Lounge on Friday evening, October 31. Music and snacks are provided by the Association, and the event is a good opportunity for returning grads to renew old acquaintances, meet new ones, and set a mood for the full-day schedule on Saturday.

Saturday will begin with registration in the Farragut Hall lobby at 10:00 a.m., followed by the annual meeting of the Association in the Library at 11:30 a.m., the Alumni Luncheon in the Cadet Mess Hall at 12:30 p.m., and the taking of group pictures of the special reunion classes in front of Shepard Hall at 1:30 p.m.

Alumni will then fall in by their former company and band designations for the parade by the Cadet Corps in their honor at 2:00 p.m., followed by the football game with Pingry School at 2:30 p.m. The Post Game Huddle will be held at Lakehurst NAS (now known as NAEC) from 5:30 to 7:00 p.m., and the dinner-dance from 7:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. Hors d'oeuvres will be served free at the Huddle, and drinks will be available at a cash bar at very reasonable prices. Good music, the honoring of Captain Klein, and special awards and recognitions will be featured throughout the dinner.

Prices for the Homecoming will be as follows: \$3.50 for registration, which includes luncheon (children under 12 will be admitted for \$2.00), and \$18.00 each for the dinner-dance. This makes a total of \$21.50 per person, or \$43.00 per couple, to attend the luncheon and dinner, in addition to registering.

The Executive Board is also offering alumni a package price of \$20 per person, or \$40 per couple for both events if reservations are made in advance. This is a savings of \$3.00 per couple.

Details of Homecoming will be mailed to all alumni some time during September.

Alumni Honor Wood '38 And Foley '46 With "D.A." Award

A naval officer and a leader in the corporate personnel field were honored here on June 7, during the commencement program in Robison Hall, when Alumni Association president, William P. Garwood '49, presented the Distinguished Alumnus Award to VADM S. Robert Foley, Jr., USN, Class of 1946, and Thornley B. Wood, Jr. '38.

The pair become the sixth and seventh recipients of the Association's highest honor since it was first established in 1976. The award recognizes an individual's achievements in any field of endeavor in which he is engaged. Previous winners are: Frank P. Wendt '42, VADM Shannon Cramer, USN, Ret. '40, RADM Alan B. Shepard, Jr. USN, Ret., '41, George F. Theobald '39, and Dr. Anthony R. Fernicola '37.

Foley travelled from Wash., D.C., and Wood came from Denver, Colo. to accept the individually-made statuettes of Admiral David G. Farragut, on a base and under a glass dome, that mark the distinctive award.

President Garwood's presentation remarks were as follows:

We are privileged and honored - AND I REPEAT PRIVILEGED AND HONORED - to bring two of our very own here today so that the Alumni Association can, with your indulgence, pay honor to their outstanding records of progress since graduating from here in 1938 and 1946.

THORNLEY B. WOOD '38
Our first recipient's is, perhaps, one of our "greatest" Alumnimembers, and I use the words "greatest" because he has been just that since graduating in 1938. For while he has been an extremely busy individual all of his life, he has always managed to find time to be of service to the Association and to our Alma Mater. He has served as President, Class Agent, and Chairman of the Annual Farragut Fund. He is the very first Alumnus to address a commencement audience, and he was the principal speaker when the Alumni Association observed its 25th Anniversary in 1963.

One of Farragut's all-time great football players, he averaged 58 minutes a game for four years while quarterbacking the Columbia University teams of 1938 through 1941. He also found time to make the Dean's list and earn distinction as an Honor Scholar. He holds B.A. and M.A. degrees from Columbia and he was president of his class.

He has worked for the C.I.A., has been a management consultant, an Assis-

tant to a Vice President of Operations, a Director of Personnel Development, Vice President - Human Resources for the Samsonite Corp. for the past twelve years, and is currently Senior Vice President - Human Resources, for the Penn Central Corp., New York City. He served with the Navy during World War II and attained the rank of Commander.

The primary purpose of the Distinguished Alumnus Award is to recognize an individual's achievements in one or more fields, but it is difficult to separate his attainments in the field of business from his other achievements and all that he has done for Farragut. His primary distinction at this point in his life is his recognition throughout the country as a leader in the field of corporate personnel activity, and we take this opportunity, today, to call him to this platform so that all members of the Alumni Association and Farragut Family can pay him honor for the distinction he has brought to the Academy by his individual accomplishments. It is my pleasure to introduce to you one of the two recipients for this year, who, once wrote the following:

"To you who recall the days at Farragut with pleasure and nostalgia, to you who laughed at stories and scufflebutt in the Canteen, to you who sacrificed and strived for victories on athletic fields, to you who matured under the guidance and instructions of an inspired faculty, to you who won academic and naval honors, to you who remembered with a sigh, the girl, the night, the dance; and to you men, the answer is a simple one. A portion of you remains at Farragut, and part of the School is in your hearts and minds."

One underlying characteristic about our next Distinguished Alumnus is his interest in Farragut and its Alumni, despite the fact that he graduated from here, entered the United States Naval Academy, and then went on to carve an exceptionally busy and outstanding career as a Naval Officer over a period of thirty years.

Back as far as 1946, while a Midshipman at the Naval Academy, he wrote that since he was a Midshipman and was not entitled to any leave, he could not attend a dance that the Alumni Association was holding. "I hope that your affair is a grand success and I'm sorry that I won't be able to

attend," he wrote. Later, he wrote to tell us that he had relieved another Farragut graduate, Captain Bill Geiger '41, at the Navy Department. Still later, he notified us that Alumnus Red Shaffer, also of '46, had been selected as Rear Admiral. And it was he who proudly told us that Farragut might have a "first" when he informed us that Vice Admiral Bill Small '44, was commanding the Navy's SIXTH FLEET while he was commanding the SEVENTH. This was simultaneous, and, as he wrote, Farragut should consider this a "hell of an endorsement to have two Farragut graduates in these important posts."

While he has not been able to get back as often as he would like, he has always kept in touch, supported the Association's annual programs for a better Farragut, and gladly accepted this opportunity to come here today to address the graduating Class of 1980.

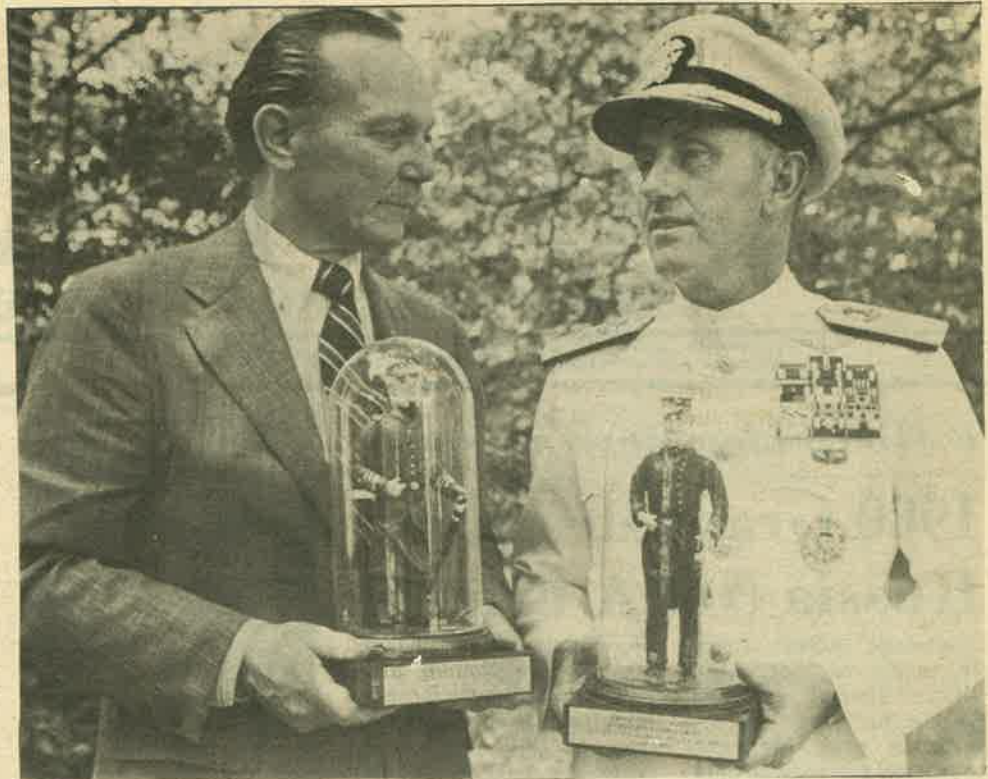
His first operational assignment with Composite Squadron FOUR in the Pacific and Mediterranean was as a night fighter and Special Weapons pilot. Later, he returned to the Naval Academy as an instructor and then joined Attack Squadron THIRTY-SIX aboard the USS SARATOGA.

In 1961 he attended the Naval War College and then was assigned to the Staff of the Commander in Chief, U.S. Naval Forces Europe. In 1965 he was Executive Officer of Attack Squadron ONE HUNDRED SIX, and then became C.O. a year later. His Squadron won the Battle Efficiency "E" while deployed to the Mediterranean.

In 1968 he was graduated with distinction from the Air War College and also earned a Master of Science Degree in International Affairs from George Washington University. He then assumed command of attack Carrier Air Wing ELEVEN aboard the USS KITTY HAWK and led Air Squadrons through combat operations in the Gulf of Tonkin. Later, he served on the Air Weapons System Analysis Staff in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations.

In 1971 he became commanding officer of the USS CORONADO, in 1972 he took command of the USS MIDWAY, and again participated in strike operations over North Viet Nam.

Following his MIDWAY tour he became Chief of Staff to the Commander of the SEVENTH Fleet, and was selected to Rear Admiral in 1975. He returned to Washington as Deputy Director, strategic Plans and Policy Division, and then served as

Commander Carrier-Group SEVEN. In May of 1978 he was promoted to Vice Admiral and Commander of the SEVENTH FLEET until February of 1980. At the present time he is Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Plans, Policy and Operations.

He has won the Distinguished Service Medal,

Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, nine Air Medals, two Navy Commendation Medals, and the Presidential, Navy, and Meritorious Unit Commendations.

What more can you say about an individual's success in a given field? Certainly,

he has made this record on his own and has, in our estimation, achieved a mark of distinction not only for himself and his family, but for Farragut, as well.

The diplomas that our graduates will receive today have been made more valuable and honored by his achievements.

Chef Rich Schneider Making Name For Himself

CHEF RICHARD SCHNEIDER '61 always has a smile and a one-liner ready. His south Jersey accent, trim physique and calm resolution under unbelievable pressure don't deliver the image one usually attributes to a master chef. Yet his exceptional culinary skills recently earned him a position on the 1980 U.S. Culinary Team. The team will compete in the upcoming International Culinary Competition in Frankfurt, Germany.

Schneider has the added honor of being the only American-born and trained chef on the national team, comprised of four men who will prepare hot dishes for the judges. The team as a group also will be judged on its hot dishes displayed cold, and cold food platters.

When asked if he has any advice for aspiring young chefs Schneider immediately quips, "Yea, become a doctor!" But then quickly adds, "Seriously - don't ask how much money and how many hours." And that's his living philosophy with Schneider.

HE WAS CHOSEN for his apprenticeship in 1963 at the Greenbrier Hotel, Virginia, by being the only kid to hold out for twelve hours in the same chair waiting to be interviewed... ("I wanted to be more than a cook in south Jersey.") His only hobby is working at least two hours a day on new show pieces and offering them to patrons on

the Wednesday night buffet. He never eats at home with his family because, "All hell may break loose at the restaurant, and I'd rather be here when it does!"

Working 18 hours a day is very common for Schneider. What drives him into competition when demands on his time are already great?

"I always wonder how good I am! When you're a chef-owner, you always do

wonder how you stack up with the chefs on the outside - the guys competing for the 'glamour' jobs?"

W.K. Russell Honored; Russell Field Named

The Academy football field, known for 46 years as "the field," was finally given a name last year during the 1979 Homecoming dinner-dance. For it was at this event that Captain W. Kable Russell, Board of Trustees president and treasurer of the Academy, was honored by the Alumni Association with the naming of the "field" the CAPTAIN W. KABLE RUSSELL FIELD.

A 24" x 18" bronze plaque was presented to Captain Russell and then retained for installation at an appropriate place in the vicinity of the field area. Captain Russell is also the Academy Finance Officer, and he is the only member of the original staff that opened the School in 1933 who is still on active duty. The plaque recognized his 46 years of service to Farragut.

Captain Raven O. Dodge, Headmaster-Emeritus, made appropriate remarks prior to the surprise presentation, citing the financial expertise of Captain Russell as one of the most important factors in Farragut's growth, lack of debt, and ability to continue to operate during recent years when private boarding schools have had great difficulties.

The President of the Association, H. Kneeland Whiting, told of obtaining authorization from other members of the Board for the naming of this important area on campus, and then pointed out the following points about the field prior to the actual presentation:

"The Field, as we all refer to it, is a facility on campus that probably means more to more Cadets and Alumni than anything else. For it has been the scene of thousands and thousands of marching feet, marching with pride before our parents, girlfriends, and honored guests. Many distinguished individuals have stood on the reviewing line watching us perform—admirals, generals, governors, cabinet members, our mothers, and even the wife of our very first astronaut. The cheers of gladness and sadness have

followed the hundreds of Middies who gave their all for Farragut football ring loud and clear in our ears. Even the crack of the bat can be heard by those who played baseball when the southwest corner of the field was home plate.

Track men have run around and over the field during exciting track meets. During World War II years an obstacle course played an important role in the physical development of the Cadets as they met the challenges that were given to them. The mothers and fathers of 23 of our honored Alumni dead soon after World War II participated in a parade to memorialize their sons, and the mere view one sees sitting in the stands and looking out over beautiful Toms River! Where else can one witness a football game and enjoy the majesty of white sails passing in the background? Truly, Captain Russell, there is no other facility on campus that can bring back as many wonderful memories and that can mean as much to all of us as the FIELD."

Whiting continued as he made the actual presentation by saying, "It is with these thoughts in mind that we, the Alumni Association of Admiral Farragut Academy, take pride in having the FIELD named the CAPTAIN W. KABLE RUSSELL FIELD from this date on. We sincerely hope that it will be a tribute to you and the members of your family for many years to come, as we all recall, with nostalgia and pride, the commands, the cheers, the shouts of joy and the cries of sadness, the bark of signals, the crack of the starting gun, the sound of the bat smacking the ball, and all of the other sounds that reflect the men who make and have made Farragut what it is today. We can think of no other facility that represents this spirit of Farragut more than the CAPTAIN W. KABLE RUSSELL FIELD."

Mrs. Russell was presented with a spray of flowers following the presentation.

Others elected to office include Executive Committee members Charles Barth, Edward Phillips, Loretto Bowers, Frederick Ward, John Sesta, and Frank Sardano. F.P.A. Meets 8 Goals In 79-80

The Farragut Parents' Association, in its 23rd year of operation, completed another successful program for the good of the Academy, during the 1979-80 school year.

The Association sponsored a membership campaign among its present parents, held Christmas and Spring dances, conducted its annual car raffle, and instituted a campaign to sell "bricks" in order to meet its goals for the past year.

The goals included the Scholarship Fund, Music Dept., Civil Air Patrol Squadron, Cheerleaders uniforms, a Davit for the Waterfront, renovation of two Cadet rooms, eliminating humidity from the Rifle Range, and the Personnel/Coaching program.

Captain W. Masciangelo, Executive Secretary, reported that the Association was able to turn over \$5,500 to the Scholarship Fund, \$1,000 to the Music Dept., \$500 for the CAP Squadron, \$300 toward the purchase of new cheerleader uniforms, \$1,400 to help pay for an assistant football coach and varsity wrestling coach, and \$100 for the Rifle Range humidity problem.

In addition, he said, \$2,800 is being set aside to renovate two Cadet rooms, plus \$1,000 toward the purchase of a new davit for boat handling.

Farragut Fund Does Well Despite Not Reaching Goal

While the 1979-80 Farragut Fund campaign produced an increase of \$6.12 for each average gift over that of last year, the final totals indicated that the Fund failed to reach its goal of \$30,000 by \$5685. While this in itself was disappointing to those persons involved with the drive, the Association was still able to make some worthwhile contributions to the five objectives supported for this year.

The final Fund total was \$24,315, with an average gift of \$61.55. By all standards, this average figure is a very commendable one when compared to other secondary schools, and even colleges, throughout the Country. One must remember that these are annual giving averages and do not include capital gifts that are quite often included by those institutions conducting major campaigns at the same time.

As Alumni Secretary W. Masciangelo pointed out, "The key to our problem is our inability to get 100% participation by those who gave to the previous campaign. If we could do this each year, our problems would be solved. We had 73.11% repeaters this year, but this means there are still 25% out there who did not support us again. With their support, it would have been quite simple to reach our goal."

With a total of 395 individual gifts received, the Fund was able to attain only 81.05% of the projected goal for this year. The Alumni Secretary continued, "I've said it before and I say it again. A \$30,000 goal figure is a very realistic one and should be within our ability to reach. Somehow, and in some way, we've got to find the correct method to increase our effectiveness as certain potential goals and then go out and reach them."

A nip and tuck race developed between the Classes of 1934 and 1956 to attain the highest percentage of participation, and, when the dust cleared, '56, led by a determined Burns Cameron, Class Trustee, posted a figure of 31.88%. 1934 followed with 27.27% after putting up a good fight until the closing weeks of the campaign. Cameron's Class also had the largest number of donors with 22. 1945 trailed closely with 20. The Class of 1959 had the largest Average Gift with \$153.57, and 1954 held on to second place with \$132.14. In total dollars, 1945, one of the perennial leaders in almost every category of giving, posted \$2025, leading '56 by \$412.

In the special giving categories were the following: Farragut Associates (\$100 up) - 61 for a total of

\$7730 and an average of \$126.72; Farragut Sponsors (\$300 up) - 4 for a total of \$1200; Headmaster's Council (\$500 up) - 8 for a total of \$4300 and an average of \$537.50; Farragut Fellows (\$1000 up) - 2 for a total of \$2000.

Seven matching gifts were received for a total of \$545 and an average of \$77.85. Companies participating were: Malcolm Black Assoc., Inc. (John Littlefield '43), The New York Times

Co. Foundation (Mr. John Slocum, Past Parent), Firestone Co. (Douglas Cavileer '43), Beatrice Foods Co. (Thornley B. Wood '38), The Bank of New York (Michael Larned '63), CertainTeed Corp. Products Foundation (W. Irwin '44), and John Nuveen & Co., Inc. (Frank P. Wendt '42).

Friends, Past Parents, and Corporations gave a total of \$6732.50. There were 89 donors in this category for an average gift of \$75.64.

Cadets Build, Stock Aquarium

The Class of 1980, with help from members of the Second Class, was responsible for the new aquarium that was built and put into operation at the Waterfront in May. Conceived and constructed by the Cadets involved, the main tank is one of the largest in the State for an educational institution.

The project got off the ground just before last Christmas leave with the acquisition of the east section of the Boat House. The first step was to clean the area for construction, blocking an existing doorway, building a separation wall, and then constructing the main tank and a series of shelves for four 55-gallon tanks.

The main tank is made of concrete blocks and lined with six coats of fiberglass.

It holds 600 gallons and is filled by a small pool filter, which re-circulates the water three times an hour. The tank will house large specimens local to the Toms River and Barnegat Bay areas, while the 55-gallon tanks will hold smaller specimens.

The acquisition of fish and other specimens is another project in itself and for the future. The School has been presented with another vessel, a shoal-draft garvey that will be used with a trawl to capture specimens and then transfer them to the appropriate tanks.

This program will not only allow the students to understand the marine environment of this vicinity, but will also enable them to understand their responsibilities in that environment.

Unbeknownst to Mr. White, he was the recipient of a special plaque, given to him in recognition of his many years of service to education in this area, at a parade in his honor by the Corps of Cadets. 14 Alumni Deaths Learned; First President Included

The Alumni Office has been notified of fourteen deaths since the Capstan was published in August of 1979. Regretfully, these members are recorded on these pages with sincere sympathies extended to their survivors: Most of the deaths have been verified fully, while in some cases only very sketchy information is available for publication. The deceased are listed in chronological order according to their years of graduation.

JOHN W. SHEETZ '34 - Sudden death on Jan. 11, 1980. He was a practicing osteopathic surgeon in Villanova, Pa. He was also on the staff of the Phila. College of Osteopathy.

WILLIAM "BILL" TORONI '34 - The Alumni Association's first president, he died in early December of 1979. He had retired from business and had suffered a series of heart attacks prior to his death. When the Association was founded in June of 1938, at the Harris Restaurant, Toms River, Bill was elected to lead the fledgling organization.

ROBERT C. BONAR '37 - A priest of the Episcopal faith and rector of St. Luke's Church, Sea Cliff, N.Y., he died last September 25, prior to when he would have made his appearance at the Association's annual business meeting at Homecoming. Bob was always synonymous with the benediction, invocation, and silent memorial prayer he conducted for the deceased alumni members at these important meetings. In addition to his classmates, he was known by a large number of graduates from 1934 to 1979. His active Association record included serving as Class Trustee, Nominating Committee, 2nd Vice President, 3rd Vice President, and Class Agent for the Farragut Fund.

JOHN Y. WEAVER '37 - Hospitalized in a NYC hospital for two months this past Spring, he died on July 5, 1980, after being released on an outpatient treatment basis. He was a retired Merchant Marine Officer, holding a Captain's license, and for years served on ships that took him on worldwide voyages. His travels hardly permitted him to attend functions at the Academy, but his two-inch thick historical folder in the Alumni Office, filled with letters and other items of correspondence, attests to his deep interest in Farragut. He was a consistent contributor to the Farragut Fund, making 37 consecutive gifts in as many years.

ALDEN HINE '39 - In early September of 1979 mail was received that he had died, but this office has not been able to obtain any

further information. Mail addressed to his former home has been returned and marked undeliverable. He lived in Fla. and Calif. in recent years and was, for the most part, in sales during his lifetime.

WALTER K. SHERWOOD '39 - Died Jan. 5, 1980. He was an attorney and served as an Associate Judge of Montclair, N.J., for many years. He was a member of Farragut's undefeated football team of 1938, playing end.

NEWTON P. FOSS '40 - Died suddenly of a heart attack on Aug. 20, 1979, at the Balboa Naval Hospital, San Diego. He was a Rear Admiral, USN, Commanded the USS HANCOCK (CVA-19) and the Training Command, U.S. Pacific Fleet, plus had a long and distinguished career after graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy.

SAMUEL P. METZGER III '45 - Died June 12, 1980, at Riverview Hospital, Red Bank, N.J. He attended the Academy from 1938 to 1945, served as Chairman of the Alumni Fund, and was an insurance broker at the time of his death.

SIGMUND J. ALTMAN '46 - Died Nov. 12, 1975, while living in Fla. He is remembered by his classmates for his extreme school spirit and active cadet life. He was in the real estate business, and he served as Class Trustee of the Alumni Assoc. from 1962-64.

DANIEL SHEEHY '49 - Died August 28, 1979. Cause and circumstances surrounding his death are not known. He is a former Class of 1949 Trustee, 1956-58, was a restaurant owner, and lived in White Plains, N.Y.

JAMES S. WIGHT '49 - Died of a stroke on August 6, 1980. He was a Life Member of the Association and served as Class Trustee for '49 on the Executive Board, 1964-66. A memorial service was held in Woodbridge, N.J. on August 16.

DENTON E. FOX '50 - Died August 7, 1979, after a long siege of hospital visits for cancer. He was an employee of the U.S. Government Energy Commission and a member of the North VA. Power Squadron.

HERBERT W. WEIMANN '55 - Died Nov. 12, 1979, in Pt. Pleasant, N.J. Hospital. He was very active in local civic affairs. At Farragut, where he spent four years, he was outstanding in music. He was a sales rep for Garden State Business Machines.

PATRICK C. JELM '57 - Passed away on July 29, 1976, at Enfield, Conn. We don't have very much information about him in recent years, but it is known that he attended the U. of South Carolina, was married, and served in the Naval Reserve.

Before that, he was Personnel Specialist and later Employment Supervisor, Chemical Division for INTERNATIONAL LATEX CORPORATION in Dover, Delaware.

\$30,000 Fund Goal Set; Includes Basic Computer

170 Alumni To Serve Academy

More than 170 alumni from 37 States have accepted appointments to serve on the National Admissions Committee that is being sponsored by the Alumni Association in an effort to serve the Academy's admissions needs.

Robert M. Lucas '53, appointed by immediate past Association president Kneeland Whiting '50 to serve as Chairman of this project, sent letters of invitation to graduates from across the Nation asking them to join together as regional representatives for admissions matters.

"We are very pleased with the results thus far," commented Chairman Lucas, "and we are certain that with an additional number of individuals helping to interview, recommend, and steer prospective students toward Farragut, nothing but good will result."

Representatives are not obliged to enroll students, but may help by making telephone calls, writing letters or notes, and possible visiting with the prospect, if at all possible.

The implementation of this program lies with CDR John C. Angell, Director of Admissions, who has written to each volunteer and has sent them copies of the Academy's current catalog. The Academy will continue to look for additional volunteers, and present and past parents will be asked to join the program in the future.

The selection of prospective candidates was prepared by the Alumni Office. Interested persons who have not been asked to serve should contact Alumni Secretary W. Masciangelo, c/o the Academy.

The Alumni Association's Executive Board has established a goal of \$30,000 for the 1980-81 Farragut Fund, and has added a new objective to the standard four programs the Association supports each year.

In addition to the Student Aid Fund, Marine Museum Fund, Headmaster's Discretionary Fund, and Waterfront Improvement Program, this year's annual giving campaign will solicit support to purchase a computer that can be used to instruct students in the basic elements of computer programming.

In announcing the details of next year's upcoming drive, Association President Wm. P. Garwood '49 expressed hope that the goal will be reached without fail. "We must meet this challenge," he said, "and prove to ourselves, and everyone else concerned, that our Farragut Family will step into the breach when the chips are down and rally to the support of this extremely important and worthwhile program."

Second Vice President William "Bill" Columbus will be the Executive Board member in charge of the overall campaign, Garwood announced.

Hopefully, the new campaign will be launched some time before December and will continue on until June 30 of 1980. In addition to general appeals from the Alumni Office, Class Trustees and Class Agents will continue to play an important role in contacting their respective classes for support. Alumni Secretary Bill Masciangelo stressed the fact that \$30,000 is a very realistic goal to reach, and he could see no reason for failing to make the campaign a genuine success by the summer of 1981.

"The objective are solid and worthwhile, and I have always felt that if presented properly to our constituents, they will do their best to be of help to Farragut," the veteran fundraiser stated. "We try to be as personal as we can in this business of winning financial support, and we do our very best to keep our entire operation a family affair," Masciangelo explained.

First School Year Recalled

Richard Cloonan was the Academy's very first Battalion Commander during the 1933-34 year. He attended Carnegie Tech, Duquesne U., and the U. of Detroit, served in the Navy's Air Combat Intelligence during World War II, has a son and daughter, and spent 30 years with the Detroit News as an editor and writer in all departments. Retired, he now lives in Escondido, Calif., near his son, who is a dentist in the area. Dick is



Because I retired some months ago and moved to California after a long career as a writer and editor on The Detroit News, our Alumni Secretary, Bill Masciangelo, asked me to write an article for the Capstan.

It was to cover sidelights of that first academic year, which weren't in the 1934 Yearbook.

The obvious thing to do first was to get help. So I went to what turned out to be the best source: Tom Whitehouse, Farragut, '34, a retired Air Force Major General in Texas. After Farragut, Tom spent a year at the University of Illinois, then went to West Point, and finally into the Army flight training in Texas.

Writing of our first year on Toms River, Tom says: "That ghastly old hotel was pretty grim, especially during January and February of a record-breaking cold winter. I remember getting up one morning to find the Listerine bottle on the dresser full of slush ice. That one building was barracks, messhall, classroom, lounge and gymnasium combined."

"Being from a family of restaurateurs and innkeepers, I was, for that tender age, a fairly sophisticated and adventurous eater (still am, only more so, naturally.) So I remember well the kitchen and the cook, who was a Filipino by the name of Calderon. (Calderon served as a steward with Admiral Robison when he was on active duty in the Navy.)

"One day, a truck pulled up to the kitchen with a huge, live sea turtle, strapped, belly-up, to the bed. For several meals thereafter, we ate that turtle—prepared in many different ways, and all delicious. There was also the Calderon's famous curry,

served once a week with a long line of condiment dishes (at least 12) down the center of each table, and the steaming bowls of rice and that monstrously pungent curry (green) that still makes beads of sweat pop out under my eyes just thinking of it. I've seldom had curry that could touch it, and only on one or two occasions have I eaten its equal, and I've spent a lot of time in the Orient." (Rice and curry was Admiral Robison's favorite dish hence, its appearance at Farragut.)

"So as not to give the impression that I considered the mess a continuous adventure in good eating, I think of one meal featuring some sort of hamburger or meat loaf. This concoction was, shall we say, a bit ripe! I felt it my duty to confront the chef, and I marched into the kitchen with some of the evidence."

"Within a matter of 15 or 20 seconds, I came flying out in considerable panic, much embarrassment, and total defeat. I had hardly begun to make my complaint when that little s.o.b. grabbed the nearest weapon, a cleaver, and started after me."

"Another incident involves the Navy fighter plane that sat at one end of the veranda of the old hotel."

"One warm spring evening, LT Jackson Lahn, the Commandant, informed me that he was going to his quarters for a short while (he had a house just down the road), and that I was in charge."

"Not long thereafter came a low whine from the veranda that slowly increased to a high-pitched scream. Ardean Miller and a couple

of cohorts were cranking up the inertia starter on the airplane. Bob Crane, my roommate, and I arrived on the scene just as they engaged the propeller, which promptly tore a gaping hole in the veranda ceiling."

"The noise, of course, alerted Lt. Lahn, who very quickly showed up."

"Guess who caught most of the ensuing hell for failing to keep the peace?"

So, you can see why I didn't write the article myself. Who could top Tom Whitehouse?

However, there is one event that stands out in my memory of that first year. It concerns myself and my roommate, Charley Waldron. The first formal Hop was scheduled for Nov. 29, just before Thanksgiving. In preparation for it, an oddball sophomore from somewhere in North Jersey, a kid about 15, knocked on our door and asked us to help him fill out his dance card by exchanging dances with him and his date. As quickly and as gently as possible, we refused, thinking we had avoided a terrible social situation.

You know what happened. The oddball sophomore showed up at the dance with the prettiest 16-year-old blonde we had ever seen. It seems that her family and his were very close, and she went to the dance with the kid only as a favor to her family. Anyhow, she was the most popular girl there, and even some of the younger faculty members danced with her that evening. Back in our room after the dance, Charley said, "Okay, I'll bend over, and you can kick me first." "No," I said. "I was just as stupid."

'79 Grid Team Is Best In 41 Years; Middies Post 7-0 Record

Last fall, during the half-time of the last game played by the 1979 Middies, a plane flew over Russell Field towing a sign that read, "ADM FARRAGUT FOOTBALL TEAM IS NO. 1" before a large crowd of worried, Farragut rooters. The reason for concern was that Farragut had registered six straight wins prior to this final game with Hun, and the Sailors were trailing 6-8 at halftime in a surprising ball game.

As the Middies returned to the field for the second half, they read the sign in the sky and, as if something magic happened, it took them a short time to get their machine into action by scoring 14 points and a 20-8 victory before the final whistle blew a halt to the best season since Coach Joe Stanczyk's mighty warriors of the 1938 year went through undefeated. It was a long, but sweet, wait for Head Coach Stan Slaby to produce another season as that, and the bedlam and exhibition of morale-boosting excitement by the Corps of Cadets and others, was something to witness.

At the end of the fifth game of the season, Farragut was the only school in the State that had not been scored upon. Newark Academy did just that in a hard fought 21-13 contest, but in the first five games Farragut posted wins of 21-0 over Blair, 6-0 over Delbarton, 6-0 over Valley Forge, 49-0 over Gill-St. Bernard's, and 22-0 over Pingry.

With a solid and veteran nucleus of seasoned underclassmen back for their senior year, plus some exceptional new talent, Slaby put it all together into a dream team. A double backfield featuring Ace Bot-

tone, Bill Muzzio, Bill Wall, Paul Lippman, and Don Chase, the Middies' outstanding quarterback, Kurt Peterson, produced an offense that gained the respect and admiration of football writers, coaches, and schools throughout the State. A tough line that played outstanding defensive ball as well as solid offense, was led by Tim Carnicle and Phil Carrozza. Eight of the eleven starters made New Jersey State All-Prep team selections.

Cadets Enjoy Sailing Trips

Six Cadets were able to participate in two separate sailing trips during the past school year that included visits to the St. Thomas Virgin Island area and to Troy, N.Y.

On March 20 the students, along with Captain Robert J. Simon and Commander John C. Angell, left Newark airport bound for St. Thomas. Their goal was a week of sail training combined with a week-long study program of the local marine life. The trip was an extension of the Oceanology program and in conjunction with the new aquarium built at the boat house here in Pine Beach.

The group, under the direction of Captain Simon, covered 134 nautical miles, visited 12 different islands through the Virgin Island chain, seeing much of the local customs and historic sites and having an opportunity to learn the responsibilities of handling a 41' ocean sailing craft. A typical day's schedule included breakfast, prepared by two of the students who were assigned to galley duties for the day. Then, courses were charted, time schedules computed, and the vessel prepared for sailing. Usually, a stop would be made around noon for lunch and time spent snorkeling and exploring the many reefs while learning about the local marine life. Sailing would then continue on to the evening destination.

The early evenings, after dinner, were spent ashore sightseeing. The watch bill was rotated during the week to allow all hands to participate in the different responsibilities and duties of the boat.

On June 9, four students had another responsibility to sail off-shore during a trip from Pine Beach to Troy, N.Y. The voyage was 410 miles long, stops were made at various places up the Hudson River, including West Point, and the crew experienced the Troy locks and dam, 184 miles above NYC.

These trips were so well accepted that plans are in the making for two more for the coming year, as well as a canoe trip down the Toms River.

Special thanks were given to Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lodgek for their hospitality in St. Thomas, and to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Stroup while in Troy. The Cadets are indebted to Captain Simon and Commander Angell for their time and training, and again to Captain Simon for the use of his own personal vessel for the Hudson River trip.

Cadets participating in the two trips were George Stroup, David Kelly, Eric Willner, Glenn Lodgek, and James Mensing. A former Camper made up the crew.

One of the most impressive displays in the Museum at this time is the collection of military plaques that covers the south wall. The plaques have all been donated by Alumni who have been, or are in command of military ships, squadrons, units, facilities, etc. A brass plate is affixed to each plaque listing the name of the Alumnus, rank, and approximate dates of each command.

The Association adopted last year a program for fund raising that promises to be very successful, even though the proposed campaign to sell named "bricks" was not officially launched before the school year ended.

Monies received from the sale of bricks will be earmarked for the Scholarship and Library Funds. In the east lobby of Shepard Hall, panelling in the form of gray-white bricks has been installed, and bricks will be sold at the rate of \$50 and \$100 each. Blue (\$50) and Gold (\$100) name plates will be attached to the bricks and will serve as a permanent monument to those supporting the program.

If a \$500 purchase is made, for example, then five gold plates would be affixed to five bricks with the name or names of the purchaser. If \$150 worth is bought, then there would be one gold and one blue name plate at-

tached. Purchases may be made in any multiples of \$50 and \$100. This form of monument serves as an excellent memorial for families to perpetuate names of deceased members via the bricks.

The Parents' Association will control the disbursement of the funds realized, and the program will be an ongoing one until all of the bricks are sold in the lobby that has been panelled for this purpose.

Matthies, Jr., Headmaster)—\$1000; Cadet Luis R. de la Garza, \$100; Mr. and Mrs. James Parker—\$100; Mrs. Rose Scheuerer, in memory of her husband (Mrs. Scheuerer is grandmother of Cadet Russell Johnson)—\$100; BLUE—Mr. and Mrs. George M. Scales—\$50.

Where Is He Now? Robert "Zug" Zastrow '48

Since their football rivalry began in 1890, Army and Navy have met 78 times. One of the most startling upsets in that long rivalry was Dec. 2, 1950, in Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium. Navy entered the game with a 2-6 record. Army was 8-0 and had a seven-year unbeaten streak (including one tie) against Navy. Army's overall record in that span was a staggering 57-2-4. But Navy — sparked by quarterback Bob Zastrow of Algoma — took a 14-0 halftime lead and hung on for a 14-2 victory over the Cadets. Zastrow, a 5-foot-11, 195-pounder, completed 5-of-10 passes for 68 yards and had a hand in every point scored. He ran for the first touchdown, passed for the second and was the holder on both extra point conversions. He also was tackled in the end zone for a safety, giving Army its only points. Zastrow had come to the Naval Academy from New Jersey, where he prepped for a year after graduating from Algoma. As a sophomore starter for Navy in '49, Zastrow earned third team All-American mention. He also starred in baseball, batting cleanup and captaining the team as a senior. But the upset of Army his junior year remained his top sports thrill.

As a senior, though, Zastrow had one of those times when everything went wrong. The team never clicked and he found himself splitting time with another quarterback. After graduation in 1952, Zastrow began his career as a Navy pilot. His non-aviation assignments included duty as head football coach for the base team in Pensacola, Fla., and as an instructor in the physical education department at Annapolis. He retired from the Navy in 1972 with the rank of commander. Zastrow, 50, lives in Tustin, Calif., near Los Angeles. He is general manager of the Prudential Overall Supply Plant in Orange County, which produces industrial garments. He is also vice president of the National Football Hall of Fame in Orange County.
