The following is an exerpt from a speech by Alumni President, Bruce Kreeger '74, at the 54th Annual Commencement Exercise of Saturday, June 6, 1987, along with highlights of the acceptance speech by John J. Pomerantz '51.

Ladies and Gentlemen...Honored Guests... the Class of 1987.

The annual presentation of the Distinguished Alumnus Award is a privilege for the Academy's Alumni Association, and we are grateful to the Headmaster and to the Administration for allowing us this opportunity to honor one of our very own, at a time of importance and in a setting such as this, the 54th Annual Commencement Exercise.

Perhaps you wonder why the Association would want to make a presentation at this ceremony?

The answer is that we feel that each graduating class and its parents, families and friends would want to share with us the pride we have for one of our graduates. There could be a member of the Class of '87 here today who will someday be singled out for

this highest award that the Alumni Association has to offer. The Award is given in recognition of an individual who has reached a high level of success in a given field

Since the Distinguished Alumnus Award was established in 1976, we have made this award to the following Alumni: 1976, Frank P. Wendt '42, Chairman of the Board of the John Nuveen Company, Inc; 1977, Vice Admiral Shannon D. Cramer, USN '40, our very first Rear Admiral, who at the time of his award, was Director of the Department of Defense Mapping Agency: 1978, Rear Admiral Alan B. Shepard '41, America's first Astronaut, also in 1978, George F. Theobald '39, an industrialist in the detergents field and President of Theobold Industries; 1979, Dr. Anthony R. Fernicola '37, an outstanding Urologist and Surgeon; 1980, Admiral Robert Foley, Jr. '46, then Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Plans & Policy, and Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, also in 1980, Thornley B. Wood, Jr. '39,

Senior Vice President of Penn Central Corporation; 1981, Rev. James B. Malley, S.J. '39, an individual who was a lawyer, Naval Officer, and a Catholic priest; 1982, Admiral William N. Small '44, Vice Chief of Naval Operations; 1983, Oskar Huber, Jr. '52, Shriner, Bank Director, and President of Oskar Fine Furniture, Inc.; 1984, Robert A. Longhi '54, Superior Court Judge of the State of New Jersey, 1985, William R. Masciangelo '37, former Director of Development and Alumni Secretary of Admiral Farragut Academy and 1986, Richard E. Schneider '67, Culinary Arts Master Chef of the year. Today's recipient of the 1987 Distinguished Alumnus Award is no exception to success in his given field and I am sure you will agree with me after you have heard something about him.

He is a graduate of Admiral Farragut Academy, Class of 1951, where he obtained the rank of LTJQ, Second Company Commander. Pomp, as he was called, was a

good steady student at AFA, and upon graduation received the "Outstanding Cadet of the Year Award." During those years at Farragut, he was on the Varsity Wrestling team (earning his letter) and was quite active in inter-company Basketball (Captain), Football (Captain), Baseball, Track and Boxing. Other activities included Boatswain Mate; Booster Club Secretary; First Class Vice President; Cotillion Club; Capstan Continued on page 7

Reinhard Memorial Hall Dedication

Reinhard Memorial Hall, formerly known as DuPont Hall, was formally dedicated during official ceremonies on the afternoon of 21 September 1986. The lobby of Reinhard Hall is now known as DuPont Lobby. Following the dedication ceremony, the Corps of Cadets conducted a review parade on Russell Field with Mrs. Ethel

Reinhard, widow of CAPT Reinhard, AFA, as guest of honor.

For almost 39 years, CAPT Reinhard was one of the key members of the staff at Admiral Farragut Academy. Starting as a member of the History Department in the fall of 1940, he held positions of Department Head, Commandant of Cadets, Director of the Summer Camp, Director of Testing and Quidance, and Dean, the post he held at the time of his retirement in 1979.


It has been conceded that no one individual at Farragut was more influential in the development of the Academy than CAPT Reinhard. No one held more different positions of importance than he did.

Later in his career, despite various physical ailments that might have curtailed many other individuals in active work, he continued with his graduate studies and earned both his Masters and Doctoral Degrees from Temple University. In addition, he rose to the rank of Captain in the Academy's table of organization.

In 1967, when it became evident that he could serve the academic area of the Academy to better advantage, he was transferred to the Headmaster's Office with the new title of Dean of Cadets. He spent much of his time with scheduling and testing, and provided a great deal of experience and advice to many staff members. He actively served the Academy's Cum Laude Society as their Secretary.

During the Dedication Ceremonies conducted on the lawn in front of Reinhard Memorial Hall; our major classroom, dormitory, office complex built in 1936, and the center of cadet activities, CAPT Reinhard was honored with Resolutions coming from the N.J. Senate and Legislature and our Alumni and Parents' Associations. These were presented to Mrs. Reinhard. CAPT Reinhard was born in Philadelphia in 1915 and had resided in the Beachwood and Pine Beach communities since 1940. He is survived by his wife, the former Ethel Kunstman, two daughters, Mrs. Susan Duque and Mrs. Jane Ingenito, and 6 grandchildren.




A wonderful time was had by all, as was witnessed by many who remained. They danced into the wee hours of the morning.

Significance Of Sword Same As America's Cup

(Note - The Following Is A Reprint Of An Article That Appeared In The Advance Nickel News, Lakehurst, N.J.)

Admiral Farragut Academy has two locations for schooling its cadets. The first established in 1933 is located in Pine Beach. The second established in 1945 is located in St. Petersburg, Fla., and is considered a division of AFA, Pine Beach. Both schools are operated under a Board of Trustees, Which is chaired by Captain W.K. Russell of Toms

On Saturday, Jan. 31, both schools held their first interschool basketball contest which was hosted at the St. Petersburg campus in Florida. The game was won by Admiral Farragut North by a score of 65-49. The game was close throughout the first three quarters. It was in the fourth quarter that Farragut North was able to dominate the boards and moved on to victory.

In order to create an added challenge for the contest, the victors trophy of the Farragut Sword was provided by the Board of Trustees.

Several years ago, Captain Russell, chairman of the Board of Trustees, was able to purchase this valuable sword from an Estate in St. Petersburg, Fla. Since the sword was sold by a Past Parent of the St. Petersburg School, Captain Russell felt it should remain at the St. Petersburg campus, rather than display it in the main museum at the Pine Beach campus.

Captain Robert W. Matthies, Jr., headmaster of Farragut North and Captain Richard G. Wheeler, headmaster of Farragut South, jointly made a decision that the significance of sword was historical and both schools should share the honor of it. Therefore, this basketball contest was created and the Farragut Sword became the prize for the winner to retain on a temporary basis by playing in this annual classic.

Captain Frederick Klein, curator of the North Campus Museum, stated, "This will now give the Sword in the Farragut world the

same significance as the America's Cup in the yachting world."


As for the sword, it has an historical background, in that it is the actual sword carried by David G. Farragut through the rank of Captain USN. During the Civil War era, the custom for high ranking officers was that they would receive a number of bejeweled ceremonial swords by their admirers. However, the sword in the possession of Admiral Farragut Academy is the real thing, as it is engraved Captain USN.

A special ceremony which included the formal presentation of

the Farragut Sword to Captain Frederick Klein, curator of the museum, and Headmaster Robert W. Matthies, Jr., was held Feb. 4 on the formation block of the Pine Beach campus. Coaches James Cresbaugh and Kurt Peterson, along with the 15 members of the Admiral Farragut Academy North Basketball Team were honored because of their victory.

Captain Klein stated the sword would be placed in the case in the lobby of Farragut Hall, under the artist model of August Saint Gauden's statue of Ad-

miral Farragut.


The Passing Of An Era . . .

Ex-merchant marine enjoyed freedom of sailing aboard ships

George W. Bleezarde, of Toms River, had to get used to rubbing shoulders with celebrities.

As a relief third officer in the merchant marine, Bleezarde, now 62, sailed on the S.S. United States with dignitaries such as Duke and Duchess of Windsor, Margaret Truman, and even Mr. and Mrs. Walter Cronkite.

"They (Cronkites) took a couple of trips...a lovely couple," he said.

Bleezarde's duties included standing watches, overseeing the loading and unloading of freight in port and checking and maintaining fire and safety equipment while the ship was in port. But when the scheduled third officer could not be onboard, Bleezarde would have the opportunity to take the 2½-week voyage between New York, England, Germany and France.

The Passaic native didn't mind standing his four-hour watches except at critical moments.

"When we had to go to the bathroom we had a hell of a time because we could only be relieved by the master or the old man of the ship, or any licensed officer," he said.

The 35-year-old S.S. United States, now docked in Virginia, was America's version of the Queen Elizabeth I and II and Queen Mary.

Bleezarde always knew he would join the merchant marines even though his father, Walter, was a Chief Petty Officer in the Navy during World War I.

"There must've been a pirate in my family because I've always wanted to join the merchant marines. I felt there was greater freedom and more room for expansion and growth than in other branches of the service," said Bleezarde.

After his graduation from Clifton High School in 1941, he attended Admiral Farragut Academy, Pine Beach, for a year before entering the Merchant Marine Academy, Kings Point, N.Y.

"My father, in his wisdom, decided I needed another year of prep courses, so I had to take a year of concentrated studies to sharpen my skills and make me come of age...17," said Bleezarde. The Academy requires entrants to be American citizens and between the ages of 17 and 25.

In 1942, Bleezarde graduated from the Academy with a degree in marine transportation and a license as a third mate, which meant he could serve on any vessel of any size on any ocean in the world. The usual 4-year-course was reduced to two years because of the war time situation, forcing cadets to put in 12-hour days of study.

Bleezarde's first duty was aboard a cargo ship during World War II, which carried bombs, ammunition and tanks from New York to Scotland. He only saw action when a V-1 rocket hit the side of the ship in the harbor at Antwerp, Belgium. The damage was minor. His remaining years in the service were spent on cargo and freight ships.

He ended his career with the Merchant Marines in 1953 with a Chief Mate's license, the equivalent of PROFILE

commander in the Navy.

"There is no way that I can ever pay back the federal government for my education which has suited me for any administrative type or general office work. My education at the Academy has fit me very well," said the veteran.

Bleezarde has since worn many administrative hats, including 13 years with Bendix Corporation in Teterboro as a management consultant and the director of admissions at Admiral Farragut for four years, but his favorite job was as a staff member of the New York Stock Exchange.

"I found that to be the most interesting. My job was to monitor each day's trading to make sure they were done in a fair and orderly way," said Bleezarde.

Bleezarde is now the program monitor for Community Development Block Grant Programs, which has him overseeing money allocated to Ocean County municipalities.

"I go out to municipalities that are recipients of these funds to make sure they are doing a good job," said Bleezarde.

"For instance if they're supposed to be removing barriers in buildings to make access easier for the handicapped, I check on the people doing construction," he added.

Because of his service to the community and the benefits received from the Merchant Marines, Bleezarde enjoys sharing his experiences with young adults and just about anyone who would listen, to help them make a career decision while still young.

"I love to speak to teen-agers about the benefits of the service and made a video tape to show these benefits," he said.

Since his marriage in 1953, Bleezarde and his wife, Margaret, has lived in Pine Beach, Spring Hill, Fla., and now Toms River. The couple has four children and eight grandchildren.

He naturally hopes the latter offsprings will all seek careers in the high seas.





Headmaster, CAPT Robert W. Matthies, Jr., to serve as judges.









Military Schools In A Democracy

The following is a paper written in the early 50's when Captain Dodge was a member of the Executive Committee of the Association of Military Schools and Colleges. The paper was and still is widely circulated for use by all military schools when answering the proverbial question:

Why send my son to a Military School?



Military Schools In A Democracy

UNIVERSAL educational opportunity is without doubt one of the central ideas in the American concept of democracy. Qovernment by the people requires that educa-tion prepare for the responsibilities of citizenship. Furthermore, if democracy is to continue as a dynamic force in society, education must have a freedom equal to its responsibility in making democratic ideals the directing influence. While all schools and colleges further these

broad objectives, the very nature of private institutions gives them a greater opportunity and makes them an increasingly valuable segment of American education.

Since early colonial days private schools have been an integral part of the development and growth of the nation. Through the years they have increased both in number and in their service to society. They are now more appropriately referred to as "independent" schools, for it is essentially their independence that has made them so vital a part of our national life.

essentially their independence that has made them so vital a part of our national life.

Independence implies greater freedom from the pressures of political, economic and social groups in formulating educational philosophies. It implies a responsibility for identifying new values as they appear in our ever changing society, for evaluating carefully both our accepted and changing mores. And finally, it implies the inescapable responsibility of providing an alert educational leadership which will assure the preservation of the values we esteem while also promoting progress toward values we esteem while also promoting progress toward

A New Independent School

THE PROGRESSIVE responsibility of the independent school is nowhere better exemplified than in the development, toward the middle of the last century, of in-dependent schools offering military training. These schools were, and are, dedicated to the same

broad objectives and functions as all independent schools – providing responsible, vitalizing leadership in education within the American framework of freedom. In addition, wise and experienced administrators believed the military program could be a valuable tool to aid in unifying all elements of a school program directed toward development of mind and character, and could provide invaluable training for citizenship and national service.

Independent military schools have grown in number until today they constitute an important segment of the entire independent school and college group. They have crystallized their objectives, consolidated their areas of strength, and discovered their potential for contributing significantly to American education.

As society has become more complex, all schools have increasingly emphasized the need for responsible cooperation by the individual within the groups of which he finds himself a part, and the need for effective leadership within these groups by competent and responsible individuals.

All independent schools offer broad opportunities for the development of these qualities in the individual stu-dent. Independent military schools, however, through the organization of their student-bodies, are able to place spe-

organization of their student-bodies, are able to place special emphasis on the individual's obligation both as a contributing member and as a responsible leader in society. Administrators and instructors in military schools believe, above all, that their duty is to fortify their students with an appreciation of social and spiritual values without which the individual lacks meaningful purpose and destiny, without which social progress gives way to disintegration. They realize that the misgiving of this atomic age as of any other age, is not about the bomb; it is about the man ... the man and what he is prepared to make of his future. ... the man and what he is prepared to make of his future.

Academic Achievement and Citizenship Training

A BRIEF REVIEW of the characteristics and procedures of military schools is perhaps the best way of demonstrating how they equip today's youth with the capacities for self-realization as tomorrow's responsible citizen.

The academic curriculum and philosophy of these

schools, which are predominantly secondary, prepare thousands of boys each year for admission to the nation's lead-

Within the classrooms and study halls, thorough scholarship is encouraged by the instructor and required by the school's standards. Knowledge, skills, and understandings preparatory to college and to life are definite educational

Strong emphasis is given to social and moral values, to

the necessity of realizing the essential dignity and brotherhood of man; for these students are living together as men in friendship and civic and social harmony. Due stress is placed on those ideals of democratic freedom which have done so much to foster the development of opportunity for the individual in a free, self-disciplined society

In one important respect, however, the military schools supplement both the curriculum and the philosocivilian independent sch fact that military service is one of the important responsibilities of citizenship, and have made definite provision in the curriculum for training in military science. They believe, furthermore, that aside from its direct and tangible values the military program enhances the effectiveness of the entire educational process.

The "Plus" Values of the Military School

THE ADDITION of military science to the independent school program contributes directly to the academic training of the student, provides distinct personal and so-cial values and rewards, and is unsurpassed as a fundamen-

tal in the development of leadership and self-regulation.

Value to the Curriculum. Military training adds significantly to the health and physical education of every student. It supplements the academic curriculum in social studies by giving meaning to military history and events, and by affording the student a more comprehensive approach to the study of many current international

In the classroom and the assembly hall, and in the religious services of his family's faith, the student learns the ideals of human fellowship and world peace. Through the military program he learns to evaluate national and world affairs with a realism necessary for the achievement of these ideals. As a consequence, the military school graduate will not be one likely to jeopardize peace, either through extreme pacifism or endorsement of ill-advised military programs.

Personal and Social Values. Outside the classroom the military school student lives amid the many helpful influences distinctive to his educational environment. While he enjoys the typical advantages of traditional boarding school experience, these are carried on within the framework of military courtesy and organization.

Many educational values are inherent in this rela-

tively simple but well organized form of group living. The student becomes a member of a social group characterized by both purpose and direction. He becomes familiar with it rather quickly, and as a part of it his life because meaningfull

The military school student quickly sees, and as

quickly accepts, his responsibilities to himself and his group. He "rounds out," individually and socially. In a true sense, he becomes a disciplined individual.

Leadership Development. Military training fits the student into his group not only as a well-adjusted member of the team, but also provides the means by which the military school strives to accomplish one of its principal objectives - development of the full leadership potential of every boy.

Progress in leadership is built through progressive stages of student responsibility. Success in academic work and in meeting military responsibilities results in promotion to varies grades of cadet officership, with en-

larged responsibilities, opportunities and rewards.

Every cadet officer receives specific leadership instruction. The performance of designated duties is a con-

struction. The performance of designated duties is a constantly supervised laboratory project in the art of leading his fellows. He is taught that officership is the exercise of leadership rather than the mere relaying of orders.

Cadet officers are charged with the development of student government, with responsibility for control of their social group, and frequently with the initiation of

the necessary group, and frequently with the initiation of the necessary group controls.

Through such responsible participation, and with helpful sympathetic guidance, boys are prepared to func-tion both as intelligent followers and effective, mature leaders. They develop a sense of duty to one's self and one's group; they become poised, socially adaptable, self-disciplined and psychologically adjusted to their surroundings. These are educational rewards that cannot be neglected or overlooked.

Specific Benefits. The direct values of military training in schools are especially apparent in days such as these, when military service may for some years to come be an important part of the civic duty of every Graduates of military schools help, in no small way, to meet the ever-present problem of obtaining well trained officer personnel in adequate numbers.

The Military School's Pledge to the Nation

HE MILITARY SCHOOL gives attention, first and foremost, to the development of the man and his mental, spiritual and physical strength.

The military school holds that it is through the education of young men in the broader responsibilities of citizenship in a free world that war can be abolished and permanent peace achieved.

In this spirit, and with this program, the American military schools enter voluntarily into a compact with American democracy to the end that this nation of free men, living abundantly in a free society, may properly fulfill its share of responsibility in leading all nations toward the goals of human freedom and total

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



Teacher Of The Year - 1987

Colonel Charles F. Harrington, Jr., U.S. Air Force (Retired) entered the Air Force in 1951 and served twenty-eight years. His career as a fighter pilot spanned the Korean War and the Vietnam War periods. He had 211 combat missions in the Vietnam War and his awards include the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross and 15 Air Medals. Colonel Harrington joined Admiral Farragut Academy in 1980 as a History teacher. 



Local coach to appear on TV's 'Falcon Crest'

PINE BEACH - Stan Slaby, here, probably is best known for his 35-year tenure as athletic director at Admiral Farragut Academy, but come fall the coach will become a television

It seems Slaby has been remembered by a former cadet who chose to pursue a career not on the high seas but in Hollywood.

The former cadet, Lorenzo Lamas, also known as Lance Cumson on the CBS drama, "Falcon Crest," recently invited Slaby out to California to appear on the nighttime soap opera.

"I was voted into the New Jersey Coaches Hall of Fame last March," Slaby recalled "Somehow Lorenzo found out about it and called to congratulate me.

"He also invited me out to California and promised to make a star out of me," Slaby said laughing. "I said to myself, why not."

"The people were the best thing," he said grinning broadly. "They made me feel so comfortable, like I belonged

He met many of the cast members, and was especially taken by the women: Ana-Alicia, "she's very pre-tty;" Susan Sullivan, "she was shooting a fire scene and didn't look so good," and matriarch Jane Wyman, 'very much a lady.'

"No one gets to talk to (Miss) Wyman too much," Slaby confided, "although she was very pleasant about getting her picture taken with me.'

During his three-day stint on the set, Slaby portrayed one of a group of farmers hired by Melissa (Miss Alicia) to flood Angela's (Miss Wyman) home with water from a tanker.

"Melissa hired us farmers because she was mad at Angela," Slaby explained. "We flooded the entire Falcon Crest mansion.

"I'm seen in one scene driving up to the mansion, in another scene handing the hose out and in another



bringing the hose back to the truck,"

Because of the threat of a strike that may halt production of network series later this summer, Slaby said cast members have been working 12hour days to get as many episodes filmed as possible.

"Lorenzo was so busy during the week I was out there," Slaby admitted, 'but he couldn't be nicer and he made the directors promise they'd get 'coach' in as many scenes as possible."

And speaking of Lamas, what's the lowdown on the son of the late Fernando Lamas and Arlene Dahl.

"Well," Slaby said slowly, trying to decide just how much information to reveal, "he attended the academy during the late 1960s.

"His press releases say he's 27, ' he said trailing off, as if unwilling to reveal the actor's true

So what about Lamas' athletic prowess?

"He played football and wrestled for me," Slaby recalled, "and between you and me, he was probably a better wrestler.'

Lamas, though, has retained his athletic ability, Slaby interjected, although he has switched to automobile

"And he still has his sense of humor," Slaby said, laughing. "He thought it was great fun when we covered his trailer with a star with my name on it.

"And you know what," he added, excitement creeping into his voice, "I even gave him my autograph."

In return, Slaby received a check for three days work on the set ("you'll never see that check cashed") and a gold Rolex watch from his former student.

"I couldn't believe it when he gave me the watch," Slaby said, his voice quavering. "But Lorenzo said it was because of all I've done for him.'

And although Slaby is eagerly awaiting his debut this fall, he doesn't plan to go before the cameras again any time soon.

"It's too much work," he admitted, laughing. "Once is definitely enough.

Academy Presents Mac Arthur Award

Each year, on or about Jan. 26 (MacArthur's birthdate), the General Douglas MacArthur Foundation presents the MacArthur Award to outstanding Cadets of the Association of Military Colleges and Schools. The objective is to encourage students of the member institutions to emulate and practice the qualities exemplified by Douglas MacArthur as a cadet at the West Texas Military Institute and at the U.S. Military Academy.

The criteria for the award is the most soldierly performance by a senior class cadet considering academics, athletics and leadership.

This year's recipient is Cadet Commander Brian E. Crane from Colts Neck. Among his many accomplishments, he ranks number 2 academically in a very competitive class of 52 seniors, with a 92.62 GPA, is captain of the Varsity Rifle Team and battalion commander of all cadets at Admiral Farragut Academy.

The award was presented on Feb. 3 by Lieutenant Colonel Sam Wrightson, U.S. Army, a 1966 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy and, currently, the assistant commandant at the Military Academy Preparatory School at Fort Monmouth and one of the current members of the Board of Directors of the MacArthur Foundation in Norfolk, Va.

Following a brief overview of the history and mission of the USMA and MAPS, LTC Wrightson commented on the career highlights and accomplishments of General MacArthur and quoted from the famous "Duty, Honor, Country" speech made by MacArthur to the Corps of Cadets at West Point in 1962.

Admiral Farragut Academy is centrally located in Pine Beach. The Academy is named in honor of the U.S. Navy's first Admiral, David G. Farragut, who was appointed in 1866. In 1941, Farragut was designated the first Honor Naval School by the Secretary of the Navy; and, in 1966, the school was named a Junior NROTC unit. The Academy continues as the only preparatory school with naval training in the United

The 40-acre waterfront campus dominates the Toms River which flows into the Barnegat Bay. Academy enrolls 230 cadets from grades seven through 12 and post graduates. The cadets wear the Farragut naval uniform and follow a daily routine similar to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis. The naval program encourages advancement through the ranks of the corps of cadets which corresponds to advancement in general seamanship and NJROTC ratings. The emphasis centers on the development of the cadet's sense of responsiblity, cooperation, time management, organization and pride in completed tasks.

The 1987 . . . Convocation Ceremony at Admiral Farragut Academy

On the night of Wednesday, September 9, Headmaster, CAPT Robert W. Matthies, Jr. introduced Franklin V. Fischer as the 1987 Convocation speaker.

(Note: The following information is a reprint of both CAPT Matthies' introduction and of Franklin Fischer's speech. Enjoy these meaningful "words of wisdom.")

Our speaker this evening was first introduced to Farragut in 1949 when he was appointed to serve as bandmaster. For the next four years he molded and directed a precision marching and playing unit. At the end of the 1953 school year he left Farragut to explore other opportunities only to return in September of 1972 with his son, Curt, who was enrolled as a fourth classman. During Curt's years of study, our speaker again was called to duty to, in the sudden absence of the Music Director, arrange and conduct the memorable Christmas concert of 1973. But still his service to Farragut did not end, for in 1976 during his son's first class year, he was overwhelmingly tapped to be the President of the Parents' Association. In 1980 he served once more, this time as an Assistant Admissions Director.

Today his resume reads like a who's who in the field of arts and music. He commands the 63rd Army Band and serves as staff band officer for the New Jersey Department of Defense. He is a Past President of the Armed Forces Bandmasters Association of the United States and a long time member of the music educators national conference. He is a Commissioner of the New Jersey state council on the arts, and is the Ocean County Director of Arts and Development.

He has been a Republican State Committeeman from Ocean County since 1961 and served as a member of the Dover Township Committee from 1962 through 1973. He is a Past President of the Dover Township Board of Health and serves actively on numerous boards and organizations related to the Arts and Humanities.

At this time it is my pleasure to introduce to you a loyal and long time friend of Admiral Farragut Academy:

Franklin V. Fischer

I am pleased to be with you this evening and to take part in this memorable program that heralds the beginning of a new year at Admiral Farragut Academy; a year dedicated to excellence in education.

There are matters of importance that I believe should be said on an occasion like this. They are matters to which I am sure you would wish your attention to be directed. ... For there are moments when it seems that we have lost the spirit which animated Lincoln when he said of our Declaration of Independence that it gave " liberty, not alone to the people of this country, but hope for the world for all future time. It was that which gave promise that in due time the weights should be lifted from the shoulders of all men'. - That is what Abraham Lincoln said.

Therefore, I want to talk to you for a few minutes about what we can and should give to the general well being of the society of which we are all a part. This is an important matter; because the strength and significance of our nation is firmly based on the principle that each of us, in his own way, must give to the welfare of

all. We must give of our time, our talent, our money and ourselves.

Since I know that it is a custom at this Academy to use nautical terms in everyday affairs; I might paraphrase my remarks to you by saying that what I want to talk about is...'Do your best to pull your full weight in the boat.'

In dealing with this subject, there are three points that seem to be particularly important. First, you rightly should feel a deep sense of satisfaction and achievement that you are attending this Academy; that you are to be guided in your studies by a distinguished faculty, who will show you how you might make constructive and effective use of your talents. Also, you will benefit from the association of your fellow Cadets, in that you will learn a good deal about human relationships and how to work effectively with others...In both of these relationships I do not doubt that there will be times when the going will be rough. A famous philosopher once said that 'man begins to think only when he encounters obstacles'. I do believe that the lessons which will prove to be of the greatest significance to you will be those which were learned with difficulty. Then you will grow in understanding and wisdom. That in the future, whatever the problems, whatever the obstacles, whatever the challenge you will be able to say to yourself with a sense of deep satisfaction...'I can do it...I can accomplish my assigned mission."

The second point I want to

make is, as you begin this new Fall term, it will be helpful to you to realize that you, in a greater measure than you have expected up until now, will be responsible for your performance.

You will be expected to assume a greater responsibility for your actions, for your studies and for your attitudes and you will be judged on the results that you achieve in undertaking these responsibilities. That judgement is likely to be impersonal and will sometimes seem to be arbitrary. Your cue in such a situation is to see yourself to improve the situation rather than to become angry or discouraged. It is easy to feel sorry for yourself, to assume that others are unjust. It requires courage and strength to look at such matters from the other fellow's point of view. However, if you are to achieve the success which I know you want to achieve, it is necessary that you hold your emotions in check, look at the situation in broadcast perspective and seek diligently to arrive at a conclusion which will stand up under scrutiny. This process of assuming responsibilities and adjusting yourself to carrying them effectively will go on throughout your

Finally, I do not want to complete this assignment without giving the greatest emphasis to the fact that your highest calling will come in the amount of time and energy that you are willing and ready to give yourself to benefit the Academy and the Corps. There is a compelling necessity

that you have concern for the genuine welfare of your associates. The Navy doctrine states it best – "Loyalty down as well as loyalty up." It is rather easy for the subordinate to give loyalty to his superior. This is in the nature of things. It is not so easy, but just as important, that a superior have loyalty for his subordinate.

Our greatest satisfaction comes from knowing that we have done our best to pull our full weight in the boat. Each member of this Corps of Cadets is a part of an historic tradition...a part of the "Long Blue Line" that has continued to build a proud record of excellence in the community and throughout the nation. You have a big job ahead of you, how well you do that job will reflect upon those cadets who have gone before you, your parents, yourself and Admiral Farragut Academy.

I wish you success during the school year.



The Headmaster – 1987-88 An Analogy Between Fine Restaurants And Fine Schools

(NOTE: The following is a reprint of an article that appeared in the Independent School Management Advisory Letter Brochure)

Schools are quite unlike most businesses. If the price of the service is reduced, people do not flock to the institution as they would a sale. Quite the contrary, experience shows that reduction in the price of a school produces reduced interest. Parents seek quality; a lower price implies lower quality. Similarly, many other business characteristics fail to fit the independent school.*

However, a fine restaurant is one business which has much in common with a fine independent school, as demonstrated by the following:

Word-of-mouth is the major marketing component.

- · Reputation is built around quality and attention to individual
- · People will travel up to forty miles one-way.
- The site itself need not be attractive nor the exterior facilities be the best. Excellent environments are created by adopting old structures that were built for other purposes.
- · High prices imply high quality.
- · Management and the professional staff are critical to continued success.
- · Everyone who seeks out the service has spent many years becoming something of an expert (having either frequented many

restaurants or attended many classes).

· Clients are willing to give money beyond the cost of the service, if they are well satisfied (both tips and school donations "follow performance").

The analogy holds rather well, except that creativity is not as well rewarded in schools as it is in food preparation at restaurants. Parents prefer the stability of traditional academic approaches in most cases.

The worth of analogy lies in the fact that the success of the school, like the success of a fine restaurant depends upon constant attention to quality and to customer satisfaction. Too often, teachers and administrators miss the point that parents are customers, so fail to attend to individual differences and needs. When school people act this way, they resemble those in a large cafete-

ria (or school) that offers some quality food (programs) but give little attention to presentation or individual preparation.



Director Of Admissions – 1987-88 Leadership Through Experience

In 1958 a young clergyman was addressing an eighth grade graduation. The auditorium was filled with over 1500 people and the thirty-four youngsters in the class were starry eyed with excitement and pride. With eyes and ears riveted on the popular clergyman's every word and gesture he concluded his remarks to the class with a statement – "BE AN ENGINE, NOT A CABOOSEIII"

1958 was a simpler time in the United States. President Dwight D. Eisenhower was in his second term as President and was an international hero and role model. He was America's father figure. Role models were easier to find and follow. They maintained a strong role in the American family sys-

tem. They were the leaders, clergy, governmental, military, etc.

Today leadership, dependability, consistency in daily habits, commitment to, and pride in completed tasks, reliability and responsibility are illusive characteristics among many Americans. Admiral Farragut Academy, with campuses in Pine Beach New Jersey and St. Petersburg, Florida, provides a setting where young boys, coming as boarding and day students, grade seven through Post Graduate in New Jersey, and grade five through twelve in Florida, experience leadership everyday in a naval training routine.

No, this military school is not for the world's troubled boys; nor does it provide tools for "pillage


and plunder!" Rather, Admiral Farragut Academy provides a consistent, regulated daily routine where qualified student officers, selected from the ranks, manage the daily schedule of their fellow cadets, serving as young leaders in a clearly defined decision making process.

The school curriculum is strictly college preparatory. One hundred percent of the senior class is accepted to college. Each year between four and eight young men are appointed to U.S. military service academies. Two Farragut graduates, retired Admiral Alan B. Shepard, the first man in space, and retired Air Force General Charles Dukes, flew to the moon representing the United States of America.

The ultimate goal of Admiral Farragut Academy, today and since 1933, is to develop in qualified young boys the pride in completed tasks, organizational and time management skills, and leadership training necessary to be prepared for a future life's assignment which will require that they "Be an Engine, not a Caboose."

The Great Teacher Program In Full Swing

Captain Frederick N. Klein, Jr. USN (Ret.) stated that in 1988, two more QREAT TEACHERS of the past were elected by the Farragut Cum Laude Chapter to the Gallery of Great Teachers: LCDR Rudolph Snyder and LCDR Dayton O. Newton.



LCDR Snyder Junior School Teacher 1934-1957

LCDR Snyder: Junior School teacher 1934-1957. Mr. Snyder started his teaching career in an ungraded school in 1899. When he retired from Farragut, he had completed 58 years as a teacher. He held a number of teaching positions from 1899 to 1917 which included Kyle School for Boys, Flushing NY; Freehold Military Academy, NJ; Minersville High School, PA where he was principal; Newton Academy, MA; Harrington High School, DE, again as principal. In 1917, he joined Wenonah Military Academy, PA, as headmaster of the junior school and remained there until Wenonah closed its doors in 1934. He came

immediately to Admiral Farragut Academy where he established the junior school and remained at Farragut until he retired at age 71 in 1957, a period of 23 years. LCDR Snyder died in July 1963.



LCDR Newton Music & Science Teacher 1954-1971

LCDR Newton: Music and Science teacher 1954-1971. Mr. Newton was a talented and versatile musician. He was accomplished in all musical instruments from piano and violin through the basses to the piccolo. He was a master teacher of music and he was a great showman. His military band, concert band, stage jazz band and Glee Clubs were of the highest quality. The drum contests he arranged for each concert were the highlight of these performances and widely acclaimed by cadets and faculty alike. He also was a great composer, and while he said 'he never made a nickel as a composer," he further said, "I made a little reputation." He was a personal friend of, and worked with,

the great Duke Ellington.

Mr. Newton taught music during the school year, and for twenty-five years in the summers as "Captain Newt," he sailed as master in his 119 foot schooner, AD-VENTURE, a cruise ship out of Penobscot Bay, Maine. While at Farragut, he combined his two loves-music and sailing ships-into a perfect blend. He restored the 98 year old schooner, EMMA C. BERRY, at the waterfront; and during these six years his band cadets not only learned music under a master, but also the lure of old ship restoration. The EMMA C.

BERRY is now at the Mystic Seaport in Connecticut.

We now have seven GREAT TEACHERS enshrined: Mr. Cedric H. Lewis, Mr. Alfred A. Lesser, Mr. William H. Kelly, Mr. Gabriel Daniel and Mr. David A. Elms (Charter on 1986); and we are proud to add Mr. Newton and Mr. Snyder in 1988.

We still want nominations from the alumni, but remember they must be teachers not administrators. The administration of the past are already honored by having buildings and rooms named for them.

The Gallery of Great Teachers

The Great Teacher Recognition program is a reality. The first five teachers of the past elected to the GALLERY were the late Cedric Lewis, Mathematics, Mr. Alfred Lesser, Science, and Mr. William Kelly, English; and retired teachers Mr. David Elms and Mr. Gabriel Daniel. Beautifully prepared pictures showing classroom action have been hung in the memorial lobby of Shepard Hall.

For the information of all alumni, the criteria for the election of a past teacher to the Gallery of Great Teachers was approved by the Farragut Chapter of the Cum Laude Society at the spring meeting in May 1986.

Clause a: To be elected to the Gallery of Great Teachers, a man should have spent a great part of his career at Farragut in a teaching, not administrative, capacity.

Clause b: There really is no way a formal list of qualifications for a Great Teacher can be established, a Great Teacher establishes himself. Normally, he should be retired from Farragut.

Clause c: Nominees for election to the Gallery of Great Teachers will be by poll of the entire alumni.

Clause d: Election of a past teacher to the Gallery of Great Teachers will be by unanimous vote of the on-board membership.

The Cum Laude Society plans to hold an election of past teachers for admission to the GALLERY OF GREAT TEACHERS annually at the spring meeting. As the nominations are to come from the alumni at large, please fill out any nominations you may have who fit the approved criteria.







Wilsonville, Alabama.





During 1980-81 he served as the commissioning Commanding Officer of the newly built amphibious heavy lift ship HMAS TOBRUK and, while in command, was promoted to Captain.

In the rank of Captain he served as Director of Naval Officers' Postings (1982-83), Director of Naval Force Development (1983-84). Commanding Officer of DDG 41, HMAS BRISBANE, (198485) and Director of Naval Plans (1985-87). He was promoted to the rank of Commodore in February 1987 and took over as Naval Attache Washington and Naval Adviser Ottawa in March 1987.

Commodore Doolan and his wife, Elaine were married in 1966. They have three children: Philippa (18), Shauna (14) and Giles (12), all of whom accompa nied their parents to Washington.


From The Desk Of The

Local plumbing supplier gets small business honors

NEWTOWN - Philip Edelstein didn't know his elbow from a lock washer when he started selling plumbing materials 40 years ago.

But next week, as Connecticut's Small Business Person of the Year, he will go to Washington, D.C., as one of 50 people in the country to be honored by the Small Business Association.

One of them will be named national Small Business Person of the Year.

"Don't worry, it's not going to be me," says Edel stein, a Newtown resident who bought Danbury Plumbing Supply in 1970 when there were only three employees and the sales volume was \$579,800. At the end of last year, the company employed 21 people and sales topped \$6.5 million.

In Washington, Edelstein will meet a metal-fiber maker from Blacklick, Ohio, a heavy-bakery-equipment fabricator from Tacoma, Wash, and a candle maker from Port Arthur, Texas, among others - like himself, the owners of small businesses

Sitting back in his Commerce Park office, Edelstein, 62, looks content with his surroundings. "I guess I always was a salesman from way back."

"If you like selling, it really doesn't matter whether

you're selling plumbing supplies or panty hose."

Edelstein went to work selling plumbing supplies years ago when he answered an advertisement. In 1948, he bought a small outlet in Torrington that he

He then took a job in New Jersey with a larger company before purchasing Danbury Plumbing Sup-

He says he could afford to retire now, but wonders what sense that would make.

"I plan to work another 20 years or so," Edelstein says with a laugh. He reports to work at 5:30 a.m. and

usually leaves around 5 p.m. On nice days he allows he curtails work in the afternoon to go sai Candlewood Lake or to root around his garden If the business owns you, he says, you just don't

Edelstein says that a profit-sharing program has made the difference in his businss, and that his 20 workers do the same amount of work that 40 employ-

ees would elsewhere. Every month, the company computer spits out data noting the profits, overhead costs, amount of sales and gross business. The employees receive monthly bonuses based on the net profit, their salaries and

number of years with the company.

Last month, for instance, bonuses ranged from about \$387 to \$1,235. Last year, Edelstein says, the company handed out about \$120,000 in bonuses.

'We kind of say 'thank you' once a month here,"

Besides, paying dividends only around Christmas does not make much sense in his line of work because December is a slow month to move bathtubs

The atmosphere in the office appears low key and reserved. This day, Edelstein has a tie on, a rarity for

"Nobody around here wears a tie." He says he would like to take all 20 workers with him to Wash-

ington next week, but he can't.
"They are the real reason for this (award). They

Edelstein points to his workers, his smarts and a spiraling economy in the Danbury area as the reasons for his success. "I'm just smart enough to know that these young people can teach me something," he says. Edelstein was one of 11 people nominated to the Small Business Association to be the state's Small

Business Person of the Year. "It really is an exciting time for me," he says. "Nothing like this ever really happened to me be-



May the events of these final moments together form a rich memory for all of us.





1988 Graduation Speaker

'88 Graduation Speaker, Mr. John J. McMullen, addressed the graduates and stated that the Cadets would have to dedicate themselves to hard work and sacrifice in order to preserve our Nation. He is also President and Chief Executive Officer of the Burmah Oil Tankers, Ltd.; Former Commissioner of the New Jersey - New York Port Authority; current member of the Board of Advisors to the President of the Naval War College and serves as a member of the Board of Managers for the American Bureau of Shipping. Dr. McMullen formed his own Marine Engineering and Naval Architectural Firm in 1957 and is also owner of several other private

companies and is a major real estate holder.

As Chairman of the Houston Astros Baseball Club and the New Jersey Devils Ice Hockey Team, Dr. McMullen has shown his avid respect for the sports community. He also, at one time, had a limited partnership in the New York Yankees.







Farragut Headmaster And Director Of Naval Science. Along With The Nation's Educators, Join Navy For A Day

NORFOLK, VA - A total of 443 educators from Alaska to Florida and from New Hampshire to Hawaii joined together with the United States Navy here (Feb. 27) during the first ever national Naval Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (NJROTC) conference.

The Navy's top officer, Admiral C.A.H. Troast, Chief of Naval Operations, told the high school educators "top quality civilian education is absolutely essential, not only to the Navy but to our country as well. Here in Norfolk, as in many other communities, I am pleased to think the Navy is helping in this effort."

Headmaster, CAPT Robert W. Matthies, Jr., and the Director of Naval Science, LCDR Joseph L. Rossi USN (Ret.), both of Admiral Farragut Academy in Pine Beach, New Jersey, attended the conference and were impressed with the two day program. Following the conference the educators toured the Navy's newest aircraft carrier USS THEODORE ROOSEVELT and

Helicopter Mine Countermeasures ism, of social awareness, that our Squadron 12 at Naval Base Norfolk.

Vice Admiral N.R. Thunman, Chief of Naval Education at Naval Air Station Pensacola, Florida, program manager for the nation's 241 host high school NJROTC units, has expressed great satisfaction with the success of the program as a vehicle to achieve "Personal Excellence" among the youth of America.

VADM Thunman views the NJROTC partnership between the Navy and high schools across the country as a "perfect match...a hand-in-glove operation, for a relatively small investment produces immense gains in benefits to students, communities and the Navy."

"Personal Excellence" is actually two Navy programs in one - the first part emphasizes pride and professionalism among the ranks while the second encourages volunteerism with the civilian community.

ADM Troast commented on this "remarkable spirit of volunteerpeople manifest. It's a partnership between the Navy and local schools that has resulted in such things as Saturday scholars, Math/ Science initiate, Adopt-A-School, Just-Say-No-To-Drugs and the 241 NJROTC units.


The Chief of Naval Operations feels the Navy can make an even bigger impact in community schools in the future.

"We realize that we play a vital role in cultivating our young people - our most treasured natural resource. In this way, we will help build America's future...We aren't a mirror of society, we're a beacon of society, and that's what pride, professionalism and personal excellence is all about," he said.

NJROTC is a microcosm of all the Navy's pride and professionalism objectives which expresses the age-old ideal of "a sound mind is a healthy body."

"The military discipline is an excellent vehicle for this, but it takes the energy and dedication of hundreds of people...people with knowledge, experience, and wisdom to help guide our youngsters through the minefields of very difficult choices that confront them." said ADM Troast.

The CNO added that NJROTC has had a beneficial effect on the motivation and aptitude of those who participate. "In most cases," he said, "behavior problems are reduced, and academic achievement is strengthened. But from a national perspective, NJROTC and the other pride and professionalism programs may one day have a seminal importance on our entire society...growing up today carries such a strong potential for sliding into mediocrity, the NJROTC units offer an exciting alternative, a counterproposal of great force - that commitment can be fun, that's respect for one's self should never exclude a concern for others, and that nothing is so gratifying as contributing to a larger success."

Clyde Roberts Bell was born in Baltimore, Maryland on 12 April 1931. After graduating AFA in 1949, he served in the Naval Reserve prior to entering the U.S. Naval Academy in 1949. He was graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree and commissioned an Ensign with the class of 1953.

After graduation from the Naval Academy, Vice Admiral Bell was assigned to the USS YORK-TOWN (CVA 40) as assistant navigator and then as fire control division officer. He then attended the Naval Submarine School in New London, Connecticut in June 1955.

During the period January 1956 through July 1958, Vice Admiral Bell was assigned to the diesel submarine USS SIRAGO (SS 485) as the Engineer Officer and was also designated "Qualified in Submarines." He was then assigned as operations and missle officer in USS TORSK (SS 423) until reporting to the Navy Nuclear Power School in April 1959. From July 1960 to October 1962, he served as engineer officer on board USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (SSBN 602). In November 1962, he was assigned as executive officer on the nuclear attack submarine USS SHARK (SSN 591).

Vice Admiral Bell was assigned as executive officer on board the ballistic missle submarine USS KAMEHAMEHA (SSBN 642) in September 1964 and served in that capacity throughout construction and initial deployments until receiving orders to the Bureau of Naval Personnel where he was assigned as Submarine/Nuclear Placement Officer in April 1967.

Vice Admiral Bell assumed command of USS QURNARD (SSN 662) in May 1970 and operated in the Pacific. In June 1973, he originated the Type Commander Representative billet in shipyards and was assigned that billet at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington.

In May 1975, Vice Admiral Bell was assigned as Commander Submarine Squadron, THREE, serving until October 1976, when he was ordered as Executive Assistant and Naval Aide to the Under Secretary of the Navy. While serving in this capacity, he was selected for promotion to the rank Rear Admiral in February 1977

and received orders to his initial flag officer assignment as Director, Naval Communications (OP-941) in the office of the Chief of Naval Operations from July 1977 to July 1980.

Vice Admiral Bell was Commander Submarine Group EIGHT, Commander Submarines Mediterranean, and Commander Area Anti-Submarine Warfare Forces, U.S. Sixth Fleet from July 1980 to August 1982. In these capacities, he was assigned additional duties as Commander Task Forces 64, 66, and 69, responsible to the Commander, U.S. Sixth Fleet in a U.S. Capacity; and as Commander Task Force 439, responsible to Commander Naval Striking and Support Forces, Southern Europe, in a NATO capacity.

Upon Vice Admiral Bell's return to Washington in September 1982, he was assigned to the office of the Chief of Naval Operations in the newly reestablished billet of Deputy Director, Naval Warfare (OP-095B)

In June 1985, Vice Admiral Bell assumed his present assignment as Vice Director, Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff at Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska.

Vice Admiral Bell's decorations include the Legion of Merit with four gold stars in lieu of the fifth award; the Meritorious Service Medal with two gold stars in lieu of the third award; the Navy Commendation Medal with three gold stars in lieu of the fourth award; and the Navy Achievement Medal with one gold star in lieu of the second award.

Vice Admiral Bell's hometown is Cincinnati, Ohio. He is married to the former Carol Ann Murphy, also of Cincinnati.






